AN ACT to amend subsection 1 of section 4, of chapter 459, laws of 1907, as created by chapter 5, laws of 1911, relating to nomination of candidates for members of the board of school directors in cities of the first class by a nonpartisan primary election.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Subsection 1 of section 4, chapter 459, laws of 1907, as created by chapter 5, laws of 1911, is amended to read: (Chapter 459, laws of 1907. Section 4.) 1. Candidates for members of the board of school directors shall be nominated at a primary election which shall be held two weeks prior to the first Tuesday of April in each year in which members of the board of school directors are required to be elected. Except \* \* • where inconsistent with this act, and except that the provisions for second choice voting shall not be applicable to the nomination of school directors in cities of the first class, the general law relating to nomination of candidates at city primary elections shall apply to and govern said primary election.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.

## [Published February 10, 1915. CHAPTER 5.

- AN ACT to amend section 31 of the statutes, relating to the nomination and election of judicial and school officers.
- The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 31 of the statutes is amended to read: Section 31. No candidate for any judicial or school office shall be nominated or elected upon any party ticket, nor shall any designation of party or principle represented, be used in the nomination or election of any such candidate. The statement "a nonpartisan judiciary" or "a nonpartisan superintendency," shall not be deemed a designation of party or principle within the meaning of this section.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.
