JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33.

Relating to the regulation of the fishing industry on the great lakes.

WHEREAS, The rapidly increasing use of fish for food makes it highly desirable that the fishing industry should be properly and adequately regulated, and

WHEREAS, It seems impossible to reach a uniformity of state laws of the different states bordering upon the great lakes in regard to this subject, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That the legislature of the state of Wisconsin does hereby respectfully petition the congress of the United States to enact such legislation as shall give to the national government the sole jurisdiction in the regulation of the fishing industry upon the great lakes.

That copies of this resolution, duly attested by the signatures of the presiding officers and chief clerks of the two houses, shall be transmitted to the president of the senate, to the speaker of the house of representatives, and to each of the senators and representatives in congress from the state of Wisconsin.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 34.

WHEREAS, Our country is now engaged in war with the imperial German government, and

WHEREAS, The President of the United States is the constitutional commander of our army and navy and must therefore assume the responsibilities and cares of leadership in the great conflict in which we are now engaged, therefore,

Be it resolved by the Assembly, the Senate concurring, That we hereby tender to the President of the United States every support that it is within the power of the Legislature of the state of Wisconsin to give, to aid him in the organization and equipment of our army and navy, to provide food for our people and to supply our allies in Europe, and to do all things that will aid him in carrying out his obligations to the people, be it

Further resolved, That we give him the assurance of the loyal support of the government of the state of Wisconsin and its citizens, and that we will bear with him the hardships of the war, as we will rejoice with him over the success of our army and navy, be it

Further resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, signed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the Assembly, be transmitted to the President of the United States.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 35.

Relative to the Wisconsin National Guard.

WHEREAS, The Wisconsin National Guard having responded to the call of the President of the United States for duty on the Mexican border, and

WHEREAS, The Wisconsin legislature by joint resolution did publicly thank the soldiers of the Wisconsin National Guard for the manner in which this duty was performed, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That the Adjutant General be required and directed to procure suitable badges, of such design to be in commemoration of the service, in harmony with like badges heretofore issued for like purposes; to be issued to all the officers and enlisted men who were mustered into the service of the United States for this service, and who were not discharged at the State mobilization camp on account of physical disqualifications, or who were not dishonorably discharged while at the border by sentence of a general court-martial; the badges to be part of the uniform of the Wisconsin National Guard and to be worn like similar badges provided by the United States War Department and under the same general regulations, and be it

Further Resolved, That this resolution be entered in the journals of the two houses and that a copy thereof, suitably engrossed and duly signed by the Governor of the State and by the presiding officers of the two houses and duly attested by the chief clerks thereof, be duly forwarded to the Adjutant General as his direction to act.
