CHAPTER 267.

AN ACT to amend section 926-107 of the statutes, relating to number of aldermen in cities of second, third and fourth class.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 926—107 of the statutes is amended to read: Section 926—107. In all cities of the second, third and fourth class, the common council may, by an ordinance, adopted by a two-thirds vote of all its members, provide that there shall be one or two aldermen from each ward, or that in addition to one alderman the supervisor of each ward shall be an alderman, and shall determine the time and manner of their election; provided, however, that said ordinance shall not take effect until the same is submitted to and approved by a majority of the voters voting thereon at a general or special municipal election.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.

## CHAPTER 268.

AN ACT to amend paragraphs (a), (c) and (e) of subsection (6) of section 20.60 and to create paragraph (b) of subsection (6) of section 20.60 of the statutes, relating to the state fair, and making appropriations.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Paragraphs (a), (c) and (e) of subsection (6) of section 20.60 of the statutes are amended to read: (20.60)(a) • • • Annually, beginning March 1, 1918, one (6)hundred twenty-five thousand dollars, for the operation of the state fair. All moneys collected or received by each and every person for or on account of the operation of the state fair shall be paid immediately into the general fund, except as provided in paragraphs (f) and (g) of this subsection. The state treasurer and the secretary of state shall be in attendance at the state fair each year, respectively, then and there to receive such moneys and to audit and pay expenditures duly certified by the department of agriculture as having been necessarily incurred in the operation of the state fair. Of this there is allotted to each member of the state fair advisory board his actual and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of his official duties; but no

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
