## JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26.

Relating to the league of nations.

*Resolved*, That the legislature of Wisconsin is profoundly impressed by the momentous character of the constitution of the proposed league of nations recently cabled from Paris, by its supremely just and exalted purpose, by its sound generalities and elastic quality, and desires promptly to go on record as favoring its spirit and design, relatively as presented, and as urging the senators in congress from Wisconsin to give to it, in treaty form, friendly consideration to the utmost degree consistent with the safeguarding and preservation of our national sovereignty, which sovereignty, we believe, cannot be threatened by it in any possible measure comparable with the beneficent possibilities affecting humanity and civilization that it embraces.

*Resolved further*, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the president of the United States and to our senators and representatives in congress.

## JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 27.

Urging the secretary of war to equip the northwestern branch of the national home for disabled volunteer soldiers at Milwaukee to care for disabled Wisconsin soldiers who served in the war with Germany and her allies.

WHEREAS, The northwestern branch of the national home for disabled volunteer soldiers, established pursuant to an act of congress approved March 21, 1866, is beautifully situated about three miles from the city of Milwaukee. The home grounds contain three hundred eighty-five acres, about half of which is under cultivation and the remainder is a wooded park, beautifully undulating, traversed by shady walks and drives and spotted with charming lakes; and

WHEREAS, This home is located in an area of unusual healthfulness as evidenced by the abnormally low rate of mortality in the city of Milwaukee and territory adjacent thereto; and

WHEREAS, This institution is centrally located in relation to the homes of most of the Wisconsin soldiers, sailors and marines who served in the war with Germany and her allies and, therefore, easily visited by their parents and relatives; which fact, together with the beautiful surroundings and present equipment of this national home, strongly warrants the establishment in connection therewith of facilities for caring for disabled Wisconsin soldiers, sailors and marines; therefore, be it
