JOINT RESOLUTION

Relating to a joint legislative committee to confer with similar committees from neighboring states on legislation to stabilize milk prices and to protect the dairy industry.

WHEREAS, This state and its four neighboring state constitute the most important dairy section in the entire country, and the welfare of the dairy industry in all of these states is so intimately interrelated that uniform action by these states is very desirable in all matters affecting this important industry; and

WHEREAS, At the present time the situation of the dairy industry in all of these states is extremely critical, and there is great need for some effective measures to stabilize milk prices and in other respects to protect the dairy industry; and

WHEREAS, The suggestion has been made by members of the Michigan legislature that a joint conference be held of committees representing the legislatures of all of these states to consider uniform measures which might be taken for the protection of the dairy industry; therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That a special committee be constituted composed of three members of the senate and five members of the assembly, who shall be appointed as are standing committees in the respective houses, to confer with committees of the legislatures of neighboring states with regard to uniform legislation in these five states for stabilizing milk prices and in other respects protecting the dairy industry. Be it further

Resolved, That this legislature hereby extends an invitation to the legislatures of Michigan, Illinois, Iowa and Minnesota to join this state in a conference on the dairy situation to be held, at a mutually agreeable date, in Chicago or some other convenient place. Be it further

Resolved, That properly attested copies of this resolution shall be transmitted to both houses of the legislature of the four states named herein with the request that they communicate their responses to the special committee of this legislature appointed hereunder, which shall assume responsibility for completing arrangements, in conjunction with the committees named by the legislatures of the neighboring states, for the conference herein suggested.

JOINT RESOLUTION

Relating to prosecution, by the state, of actions in the federal courts to protect the markets for cattle and dairy products of this state.

WHEREAS, The constitution of the United States provides that: "no state shall, without the consent of the Congress, lay any im-
