## JOINT RESOLUTION

# Relating to a reduction in the expenditures for prohibition enforcement.

WHEREAS, The people of the United States in the last general election registered their dissatisfaction with the policy of prohibition in a most emphatic manner and left no doubt of their wish for the repeal of prohibition; and

WHEREAS, There is every reason to believe that the Seventythird Congress will submit to the several states an amendment to the Constitution of the United States which will repeal the Eighteenth Amendment; and

WHEREAS, Eight million dollars per year are now expended on the enforcement of prohibition, which represents a waste of public funds, particularly in view of the fact that the policy of prohibition will, in all probability, be completely abandoned in the near future; therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly, the Senate concurring. That the legislature of Wisconsin hereby respectfully memorializes the Congress of the United States to reduce immediately the appropriations for the enforcement of the prohibition law by at least one-half and to similarly reduce the number of prohibition agents and other federal employes engaged in the futile attempt to enforce the prohibition law, be it further
