History: Ch. Ag 5 as it existed on February 28, 1974 was repealed and a new Ch. Ag 5 was created, Register, February, 1974, No. 218, effective 3-1-74.

- Ag 5.01 Premiums and exhibits. (1) PREMIUM LISTS. (a) Fairs requesting state aid for payment of net premiums shall submit to the department, prior to May 1 of the year in which the fair is to be held, a copy of the premium list to be used at the fair. The premium lists, including premiums to be paid in various classes authorized under these rules shall be submitted in strict conformity with uniform premium lists and other requirements as prescribed in these rules. Lists or any part of a list providing for premiums not in conformity with these rules may be stricken by the department and state aid thereon denied. The list shall indicate exact dates of the fair. Any changes in dates shall be promptly reported to the department.
- (b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin when a copy is requested by them.
- (c) Wis. Adm. Code sections Ag 5.01 and Ag 5.07 shall be published in their premium books to be used at a fair for which state aid is requested.
- (2) Entry fees. (a) Entry fees may be charged not in excess of 10% of the purse offered on any specific article. When no entry fee is charged, stall rents may be charged in the horse, cattle, sheep and swine departments. In the horse department the rental shall not exceed \$1.50 per single stall, and \$3 for box stalls; in the cattle department \$1 for single stalls, and \$2 per box stall; in swine and sheep departments \$2 per pen or 50 cents per animal. A standard pen is approximately 64 square feet. In the poultry, rabbit, and pet stock department the charge shall not exceed 25 cents per head, including feed and care.
- (b) Exhibitors in the educational department shall not be required to purchase exhibitors' tickets. Other exhibitors may be required, when no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitors' season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for non-exhibitors' season tickets.
- (c) Exhibitors shall not be required to become members of the fair society, or be required to make any donations or refunds.
- (3) EXHIBITS AND EXHIBITORS. (a) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aids may not be approved for payment of premiums to

Wisconsin residents with out-of-state addresses unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that such exhibitors reside in Wisconsin.

- (b) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in exhibit buildings or actually shown in the show ring during the regular fair dates. State aid will not be paid on D.H.I.A. records, transportation aids, production contests, or the like, unless special approval is granted under Wis. Adm. Code section Ag 5.02 (8).
- (c) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fair-grounds before 4 p.m. of the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department or the local fair management. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in the case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the local fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes shall be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The local fair may prescribe the length of time horses shall remain on the grounds for junior exhibitors.
- (4) JUNIOR FAIRS. (a) In the junior fair department, state aid will be paid on prizes offered to exhibitors from 8 to 21 years of age in the following classes: club products, demonstration teams, judging teams, showmanship contests, and educational booths. State aid will not be paid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or any project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.
- (b) All exhibitors in the junior fair department shall be members of 4-H, FFA, FHA, or any other recognized youth organization under adult leadership and with an education program approved by the local fair.
- (c) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be a result of the exhibitor's own labor in the project or projects in which he or she is regularly enrolled
- (d) Premiums in the educational department shall be paid directly to the exhibitor making the exhibit and not to the school or teacher, except for group premiums offered to interschool competitive classes. A complete list of exhibitors and a complete set of judges' sheets for the education department, similar to those required in other departments, shall be filed with the department. No aid may be paid on education department premiums unless this is done. All educational exhibits shall be on display at the fair even though they are judged prior to the fair.
- (e) In the junior fair department, no state aid will be allowed on more than one premium awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number.
- (5) PREMIUMS. (a) The state aid authorized by section 93.23 (1), Wis. Stats., may be paid on net premiums only. Net premiums shall be construed to mean the total premiums paid less total entry fees received. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
- (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition Register, February, 1974, No. 218

rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify action taken by the local fair.

- (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition of the organization or for any other reason.
- (d) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open class individual livestock classes, and no more than one premium in other classes.
- (e) To be eligible for state aid, no animal or article shall be entered for competition or more than one premium except as part of a herd group or special class.
- (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or on horse pulling contests.
- (6) Dates. No state aid may be paid to fairs having split dates, unless prior written approval is granted by the department. Extreme hardship must be established by the fair organization before approval can be granted. A split date is one where exhibits or contests are judged, and premiums paid at more than one time or at more than one location during the current year. When split dates are approved, all blue ribbon winners shall be required to repeat their demonstration or exhibit at the regular fair on regular fair dates, unless exempted by the department in hardship cases. Split date approval shall not be required for dress revue and demonstration.

- Ag 5.02 Classes; general. (1) In all prescribed divisions, special classes may be established for any item, article or recognized breed where none are specified, including special classes for grade and crossbred females in beef, swine, and sheep in the junior fair division. State aid, in amounts prescribed, may be paid for such special classes.
- (2) Classes may be combined, but state aid shall be limited to maximum premiums listed for a single class of such animals, items, or articles.
- (3) No state aid may be paid on premiums awarded for any male animals (other than those which have been desexualized) exhibited in any class unless the animal is registered or eligible for registry as a purebred.
- (4) Animals entered in group classes shall also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.
- (5) State aid for premiums awarded for horses in open classes shall be limited to horses which are owned by the exhibitor.
- (6) The total of maximum premiums prescribed for the places in any open class of livestock (except poultry) may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places but the maximum premium for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum prescribed for the last place in such class.
- (7) If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in any junior fair class, at the discretion of the fair, the class may be divided into two approximately equal groups and each group judged as a class.

- (8) Special educational exhibits in the junior fair division may be instituted with department approval.
- (9) In the swine departments, mature boars may not be entered unless their tusks have been removed.

- Ag 5.03 Definitions. (1) INDIVIDUAL CLASSES. (a) Dairy cattle. 1. A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.
- 2. A senior calf is one born during the period July 1 to December 31 of the year preceding exhibit year.
- 3. A junior yearling is one born during the period January 1 to June 30 of year preceding exhibit year
- 4. A senior yearling is one born during the period July 1 to December 31 of second year preceding exhibit year. If senior yearling has calved, it shall be shown in 2-year-old class.
- 5. A 2-year-old is one born during the period July 1 of third year preceding exhibit year to June 30 of second year preceding exhibit year, and shall include senior yearlings which have freshened.
- 6. A 3-year-old is one born during the period July 1 of fourth year preceding exhibit year to June 30 of third year preceding exhibit year.
- 7. A 4-year-old is one born during the period July 1 of fifth year preceding exhibit year to June 30 of fourth year preceding exhibit year.
- 8. A 5-year-old is one born before July 1 of fifth year preceding exhibit year.
- (b) Beef cattle. 1. A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.
- 2. A senior calf is one born during the period September 1 to December 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 3. A summer yearling is one born during the period May 1 to August 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 4. A junior yearling is one born during the period January 1 to April 30 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 5. A senior yearling is one born during the period September 1 to December 31 of second year preceding exhibit year.
- 6. A 2-year-old and older is one born before September 1 of second year preceding exhibit year
- (c) Steers. 1. A senior calf is one born during the period September 1 to December 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 2. A summer yearling is one born during the period May 1 to August 31 of year preceding exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth in place.
- 3. A junior yearling is one born during period January 1 to April 30 of year preceding exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth in solidly and shows no nicking at gums.
- (d) Swine. 1. A mature boar or sow is one born during the period July 1 of third year preceding exhibit year to December 31 of second year preceding exhibit year.
- 2. A junior yearling boar or sow is one born during the period January 1 to June 30 of year preceding exhibit year.

- 3. A senior boar or sow is one born during the period July 1 of the year preceding exhibit year to December 31 of the year preceding exhibit year.
- 4. A senior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the period of January 1 to the last day of February of the exhibit year.
- 5. A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the period March 1 to June 30 of exhibit year.
- (e) Sheep. 1. A mature ram or ewe is one born before January 1 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 2. A yearling ram or ewe is one born during the period January 1 to December 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 3. A ram or ewe lamb is one born on or after January 1 of exhibit year.
- (f) Goats. 1. A junior doe is one born after March 1 of the exhibit year.
- 2. A senior doe is one born after July 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and before March 1 of the exhibit year.
- 3. A yearling goat is one born after July 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year, and before July 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- 4. A two year old goat is one born after July 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and before July 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
- 5. A goat three years old and older is one born before July 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.
- (g) Poultry. 1. Cock and hen birds are birds hatched before January 1 of the exhibit year.
- 2. Cockerel and pullet birds are birds hatched on or after January 1 of exhibit year.
- (2) GROUP CLASSES. (a) Dairy and beef cattle. 1. A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one can be a bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull from junior calf, senior calf, and/or summer yearling, bull and heifer classes, with both sexes to be represented.
- 2. A dairy senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over, and not more than one may be a bull. A beef senior get of sire shall consist of 4 animals, any age, the offspring of one sire, both sexes to be represented. In both dairy and beef gets of sire, the name of the sire shall be designated by the exhibitor. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.
- 3. A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals, any age and any sex which are the produce of one cow.
- (b) Swine. 1. A pen of market pigs shall consist of 2 animals, barrows and/or gilts and shall weigh over 150 pounds each.
- 2. A pen of young market pigs shall consist of 2 animals, barrows and/or gilts and shall weigh between 60 and 150 pounds each.
- 3. A pen of 3 feeder pigs, 40 to 60 pounds each may consist of either sex. If male pigs are included, they shall be castrated and healed.
- 4. A spring group shall consist of one spring boar pig and 2 spring sow pigs owned by the exhibitor.

- 5. A get of sire shall consist of 4 animals of both sexes, sired by the same boar.
- 6. An exhibitor's herd shall consist of one senior boar pig or one junior yearling boar, one junior yearling sow, one senior sow pig, and one junior pig, all of which shall be owned and shown by the exhibitor.
- 7. A young herd shall consist of one boar and 3 gilts, all of which are senior or junior pigs.
- (c) Sheep. 1. A flock shall consist of one ram any age, one ewe over 2 years old, one yearling ewe and one ewe lamb owned by the exhibitor.
- 2. A pen of lambs shall consist of 3 lambs (one ram and 2 ewes) owned by the exhibitor and be the offspring of exhibitor's animals.
- 3. A pen of market lambs shall consist of 2 market lambs owned by the exhibitor.
- (d) Goats. 1. An exhibitor's herd shall consist of one doe under one year, one yearling doe, and one doe 2 years old and over, owned by the same exhibitor.
- 2. A get of sire shall consist of 3 does any age, sired by the same sire and owned by the same exhibitor.

- (e) All cheese shall be stamped showing date made by month and year.
- (f) Cheese previously tested with a trier shall not be considered as an exhibit for a premium. Such cheese shall be entitled to a complimentary score only, except for Swiss cheese which may have one plug hole.
  - (g) Classes:
- 1. Creamery butter made from sweet cream of different herds, delivered at a creamery or factory. Each exhibit of prints or tubs shall be as provided in paragraph (9) (a) 1.
- 2. Creamery butter made from ripened cream of different herds, delivered at a creamery or factory. Each exhibit of prints or tubs shall be as provided in paragraph (9) (a) 1.
  - 3. Creamery butter, 5 one-pound prints.
- 4. Special class for assistant buttermakers only, providing for 4 cash prizes and 4 ribbons. The main object being to give all assistant buttermakers a complimentary score.

- 1. Plan A. School booth display representing the entire school or a subject taught within the school, limited to one entry per school. Subject matter exhibits may be in the field of Art, Civics, Crafts, Geography, History, Home Economics, Industrial Arts, Languages, Mathematics, Science, Special Education or any other subject taught in the school during the school year. Judging is to be based on such factors as arrangement, theme, entry, eye appeal, and creativeness. Premiums are to be paid to the school.

- 2. Plan B. (Individual and Group Displays). Premiums on individual exhibits must be paid to exhibitor. Group displays may be paid to teacher or school. Each pupil shall list all entries on one official entry blank. The school, name of teacher, name of pupil, address of pupil, and exhibitor's number should appear on the official entry form.
  - (b) Specific requirements.
- 1. Group exhibits are to be entered under the name of the school with grades participating listed on the entries.
  - 2. No pupil may make more than one entry for each prize.
- 3. The first digit of the entry number designates the grade from which the work may be accepted.
- 4. Individual and group exhibits may not be displayed as a part of the school exhibit.

Ag 5.07 Judging regulations. (1) Judging shall be done at county and district fairs only by men and women approved by the department for that purpose. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor

shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.

- (2) Each judge shall be provided with a copy of the premium book at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair at which he or she shall act as a judge.
- (3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.
- (4) (a) No state aid will be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any classes except in the junior and educational departments.
- (b) When classes in the junior and educational departments are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings must be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.
- (c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

- Ag 5.08 Accounting requirements. (1) All receipts from any source whatsoever shall be deposited in a bank, and all accounts without exception shall be paid by check or draft. All records, papers, stubs, checks, vouchers or other orders relating to fair transactions shall be preserved for a 6-year period subsequent to the year in which they were made or issued.
- (2) Premiums shall be actually paid or bona fide notice of premium awards sent to all premium winners before a claim for state aid may be considered.
- (3) Claims for state aid shall be filed with the department within 30 days after the close of the fair, and shall include:
- (a) Judging sheets completed according to instructions contained thereon. All entries shall be in typewritten form with the exception of entries in the winning entry column which may be made with a ballpoint pen or indelible pencil. The total premium awarded on each judging sheet shall be shown at the bottom of each sheet. State aid shall not be paid on judging sheets which are not signed by the judge or accompanied by an affidavit of the judge listing the department and classes judged.
- (b) Index of exhibitors and their addresses, with amounts paid in premiums opposite each name. The total of each index sheet shall be shown on the bottom of the sheet, and the total of the index shall correspond with the total of premiums awarded as shown by judging sheets.
  - (c) Two voucher claims for state aid.

- (d) One premium book.
- (4) One copy of the annual financial report shall reach the office of the department before the end of the calendar year in which the fair is held. State aid received for the current year shall be included as a receipt in such statement.
- (5) Before submitting its financial report, every fair association, society or board shall have its accounts audited by either a certified public accountant, a county auditor, or an auditing committee. If audited by an auditing committee, at least one of the committee members shall be familiar with the records and procedures. The society or board shall submit to the department at the time the financial report is submitted, a statement of the type of audit conducted including the date and names of those making the audit, or a copy of the audit report.
- (6) A copy of a financial report as published in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which the fair was held shall be submitted to the department prior to December 31st of the year in which the fair was held. The financial statement shall include all receipts, disbursements, accounts receivable and accounts payable in connection with the operation of the fair, and shall show the financial condition of the fair organization before and after the fair.
