WCD 10.01 Open and closed seasons. A closed season is established for each species of wild animal and bird named herein extending during all the time of each year except the open season period embraced within the specified dates, both inclusive, and except as otherwise expressly provided, no person shall take, catch, kill, hunt, pursue, or trap any wild animal or bird at any time other than the open season and established hunting hours therefor, nor in the open season in excess of the daily bag limit designated for each species or each locality respectively, nor have any such protected wild animal or bird in his possession or under his control in excess of the possession limit.

- (e) Muskrats taken in beaver traps. 1. Any person duly licensed pursuant to section 29.132, Wis. Stats., may salvage not to exceed eight muskrats which are taken in beaver traps during the open season for beaver and incidental to the licensee's beaver trapping operations.
- 2. All such muskrat pelts shall be tagged with a metal tag immediately when the animal is taken; such tags to be furnished by the conservation commission upon request. Any unused tags so furnished shall be returned to the commission at the time the licensee makes his beaver trapping report pursuant to section 29.132 (4), with wise states.
- 3. All muskrat pelts taken pursuant to this section shall be exhibited for inspection, together with any beaver pelts taken, in the same manner as is provided for presenting beaver by section 29.132 (3) (a), Wis. Stats.
- (f) Tagging of otter pelt and carcass. The pelt and carcass of all otter taken by any trapper shall be exhibited to a conservation warden by the trapper within 5 days after the close of the otter trapping season. The conservation warden shall thereupon attach and lock to each such pelt a metal tag and it shall be unlawful for any person to have in possession or under control any otter pelt taken during such open season without such tag attached as provided herein. For each female otter carcass surrendered to the conservation warden, the state conservation commission will pay to the trapper the sum of \$2. Such pelts and carcasses taken during the aforesaid open season for trapping otter beginning on March 27 and extending through April 20 shall be exhibited and tagged as provided herein in the county where trapped.

- (2) There shall be no open season on prairie chicken, Chukar partridge, Canada spruce grouse (spruce hen), turkeys, mourning

doves, swans, cranes, bitterns, eagles, plovers, sandpipers, all species of hawks and owls except great-horned owls or on any other song birds or wild birds not specified in this chapter.

WCD 10.04 Unprotected wild animals. (1) There shall be no closed season on coyotes, wildcats, any species of foxes and mutations thereof, opossum, skunk, weasel, and all other wild mammals not specifically mentioned in this chapter.

(2) There shall be no closed season on great-horned owls, crows, starlings, red-winged blackbirds, cowbirds, and English sparrows.

WCD 10.05 Highways. (1) There shall be a closed season from November 16 to November 24 inclusive, for hunting all species of wild animals and birds within a distance of 200 feet from the center line of any lettered state forest road, and of any federal, state, or county highway in those counties or parts of counties where an open season for hunting deer with firearms has been established.

(2) There shall be a closed season from September 21 to November 12 inclusive, for hunting all species of wild animals and birds with bow and arrow within a distance of 200 feet from the center line of any lettered state forest road, and of any federal, state, or county highway in those counties or parts of counties where an open season for hunting deer with bow and arrow only has been established.

WCD 10.06 Hunting hours. (1) All hunting hours when specified in this chapter mean central standard time.

(2) The hunting hours for each species of game, except deer, migratory waterfowl and shorebirds, on which an open season is established (except raccoon, fox, skunk, and opossum for which there are no hunting hour restrictions) shall be from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour before sunset as listed in the following table and it shall be unlawful for any person to hunt or shoot such game on any day during the open season before the time listed in the A.M. column or after the time listed in the P.M. column.

(2m) The hunting hours for migratory waterfowl and shorebirds shall be from one-half hour before sunrise as listed in the following table to 4:00 p.m., except as otherwise provided in WCD 10.01 (1) (b) and it shall be unlawful for any person to hunt or shoot such waterfowl and shorebirds on any day during the open season before the time listed in the a.m. column or after the closing hour.

(3) The hunting hours for deer shall be from one-half hour before sunrise as listed in the following table to sunset and it shall be unlawful for any person to hunt or shoot deer on any day during the

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open season before the time listed in the A.M. column or after 30 minutes after the time listed in the P.M. column in said table.

(4) The hunting hours listed in the following table shall apply to the entire state.

WCD 10.07 Hunting, prohibited methods. (1) No person shall hunt game with any means other than the use of a gun discharged from the shoulder or a bow and arrow, except that .22 rim-fire hand guns may be used in the same manner and for the same purposes and subject to the same restrictions as .22 rim-fire rifles.

(2) No person shall place, spread, or set any net, pitfall, snare, spring gun, pivot gun, swivel gun, or other similar contrivance for the purpose of catching or which might catch, take or ensnare game; nor with the aid of an airplane, including the use of an airplane to spot, rally, or drive game for hunters on the ground, except that foxes and coyotes may be spotted, but not shot, from aircraft from January 1 through March 31.

(3) No person shall carry with him in or on any motor-driven boat while the motor is running, any firearm or bow unless such firearm is unloaded and unless such bow is unstrung; or in or on any vehicle or automobile any firearm or bow unless such firearm is unloaded and enclosed within a carrying case and unless such bow is unstrung or enclosed within a carrying case; nor load or shoot any firearms or bow and arrow from any automobile, aircraft, or other vehicle, sta-

tionary or moving; nor shall any person have in his possession or under his control any firearm or bow and arrow in or on any vehicle or automobile while shining any wild animal.

(4) It shall be unlawful for any person to shoot into or molest or

destroy the nest of any squirrel at any time of the year.

(5) No person shall take, catch, kill, pursue, hunt, shoot, or shoot at any upland game bird, or migratory bird with a rifle at any time.

(6) No person shall hunt or pursue any wild animals in the nighttime with a dog for the period of 15 days prior to the open season

for raccoon.

(7) (a) No person shall use or have in his possession or under his control any ferret, fitch, rat, weasel or guinea pig while hunting, except as provided in this subsection. The owner or occupant of any land where rabbits are found to be doing damage may request from the state conservation commission a permit to use a ferret or fitch for hunting rabbits thereon.

(b) No person shall have in his possession or under his control or use, for hunting rabbits, any snare, trap or any device or contrivance designed or used for the purpose of driving rabbits out of their holes

or dens.

WCD 10.08 Permits for trapping rabbits and hares. (1) The state conservation commission or its duly authorized agents are hereby authorized at their discretion to issue permits for the use of box traps and figure 4 traps, such traps not to exceed 4 feet in diameter or 2 feet in height, and wire snares made or constructed of copper wire not larger than 20 gauge or with picture wire, and with a snare loop of not more than 6 inches across at its widest point for the purpose of taking, catching, or killing rabbits or hares within the boundaries of any national, state, or county forest areas where tree plantations, natural or otherwise, are in danger of being destroyed by rabbits or hares.

(2) Any person, persons, or agencies wishing to control rabbits or hares upon or in the vicinity of such areas shall first make a written application to the conservation department for a permit to do so. Such application shall state therein the purpose for which control is believed necessary and such other information as the conservation commission has required in its rules and regulations to be followed by all persons or agencies co-operating with the conservation commission in such matters, adopted on April 14, 1936.

(3) No such permit may be issued for the snaring or trapping of rabbits or hares on private lands except wherein the applicant files with his application a written statement from the owner of the land whereon the rabbits or hares are to be trapped or snared, giving the landowner's consent. All rabbit control activities authorized by a conservation department permit shall be subject at all times to inspection by duly authorized agents of the state conservation commission or

department.

WCD 10.09 Guns and ammunition. (1) No person shall, except on his own land, have in possession or under his control any rifle or shotgun on any of the inland waters of the state or in places where wild ducks, geese or coot are to be found from the fifteenth day of August to the opening date for hunting aquatic or upland game birds.

- (2) It shall be unlawful for any person to carry or have in his possession or under control while hunting or pursuing any game birds, game animals or other wild animals any shell, cartridge or ammunition known as tracer shells, burning tracer shells or any incendiary shells or cartridges which may be discharged from any shotgun, rifle or other firearms.
- (3) No person shall have in possession any rifle in territory wherein there is an open season for hunting deer with shotgun only during such open season unless such rifle is unloaded and enclosed within a carrying case, except that smooth-bore muzzle-loading muskets of not less than .45 caliber may be possessed and used for the hunting of deer during such open season.
- (4) No person shall have in possession any firearm in territory wherein there is an open season for deer with firearms for a period of 3 days prior to the opening date for deer hunting unless the firearm is unloaded and enclosed within a carrying case, except that waterfowl hunters shall be permitted to hunt waterfowl continually during the open season with shotguns only, except .410 bore, and shot not larger than No. BB.
- (5) It shall be unlawful for any person to carry in any manner or have in possession or under control any .22 rim-fire rifle, .410 bore shotgun or shot larger than No. BB from 3 days prior to the opening of a deer season with firearms in areas or counties where there is an open season for deer through the close of such season while in, on or traversing any field or forest lands in the counties or parts of counties where an open season for hunting deer with guns has been established unless said firearm is unloaded and enclosed within a carrying case.
- (6) The provisions of s. 29.24, Wis. Stats., and subs. (4) and (5) of this section prohibiting the possession of firearms and ammunition do not apply to Brown, Calumet, Columbia, Crawford, Dane, Dodge, Fond du Lac, Grant, Iowa, Jefferson, Kewaunee, La Crosse, Lafayette, Manitowoc, Ozaukee, Richland, Sauk, Sheboygan, Trempealeau, Vernon, Washington, Waukesha and Winnebago counties and in those counties it shall be lawful to hunt all species of wild animals throughout the open season. While hunting small game under the authority of this subsection, in the above-named counties, except Columbia, Crawford, Iowa, Richland, Sauk and Vernon counties, it shall be unlawful for any person to use or have in possession or under control any rifle other than a .22 rim-fire; and in such hunting in all of the above named counties, it shall be unlawful for any person to use or have in possession in the night-time any shotgun ammunition loaded with shot larger than No. BB or with single slug or ball. This subsection shall not be construed to permit the hunting of deer or bear with a .22 rim-fire rifle or with any .410 bore shotgun.
- (7) It shall be unlawful for any person to take, capture, or kill or wound or shoot at any deer or bear with any .22 rim-fire rifle or any .410 bore shotgun.

WCD 10.10 Deer and bear hunting. (1) No person while hunting or in possession of firearms or bow and arrow shall have in possession or under control any light used for the purpose of shining deer.

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(2) No person shall hunt deer or bear in the water of any stream, lake, or pond; or with a dog or dogs; or with the aid of artificial light; or with the aid of an airplane, including the use of an airplane to spot, rally, or drive deer for hunters on the ground; nor place any salt in any place for the purpose of enticing deer thereto; nor construct, occupy, or use any tree, elevated scaffold or other elevated device for the purpose of hunting, watching for, or killing deer or bear.

WCD 10.11 Bow and arrow hunting. (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to have in possession or under control any gun or firearms at any time while hunting, killing, or pursuing game with bow and arrow during the open season for hunting deer with bow and arrow

(2) Any deer killed during such open season showing evidence that it was shot with a firearm shall be an illegal deer and it shall be unlawful for any person to have such deer in his possession.

(3) No person shall use or have in his possession or under his control while hunting any wild animal or bird any poisoned arrow, arrow with explosive tips, or any bow drawn, held or released by mechanical means. Arrows used for hunting deer or bear shall have wellsharpened metal broad-head blades not less than seven-eighths of an inch in width, and not more than one and one-half inches in width.

(4) No person shall hunt deer or bear with a bow having a pull of

less than 30 pounds.

WCD 10.115 Deer hunting party permit. (1) The commission finds, pursuant to section 29.107, Wis. Stats., that the population of deer is such that an additional harvest is reasonably necessary to manage the herd properly in the state in balance with the available range and natural food supply, and there shall be an open season for deer hunting by deer hunting parties, pursuant to section 29.107, Wis. Stats., from November 16, 1957, to November 24, 1957, inclusive, in the following described areas only:

(a) All that part of the state lying northerly of a line formed by the intersection of State Highway 64 and the eastern boundary of the state thence westerly along said Highway 64 to its junction with State Highway 73, thence southerly along said Highway 73 to its junction with State Highway 13, thence southerly along said Highway 13 to its junction with State Highway 82, thence westerly along said Highway 82 to the intersection of said Highway 82 with the western boundary of the state except the following: Nine-Mile Island in Dunn County, all that part of Bayfield County lying north of U.S. Highway 2 and east of County Trunk Highway "A", all of the Apostle Islands (except Madeline Island) in Ashland and Bayfield Counties, and all of the counties of Buffalo, La Crosse, Pepin, Pierce, St. Croix, Trempealeau, and Vernon.

(2) Any deer taken under the authority of a deer hunting party permit shall be exhibited and tagged as provided in section WCD 10.20 (1) (a) in the county in which the deer was killed or in an adjoining county, but within the area designated in section WCD 10.115 (1) (a), not later than 10:00 p.m. of the last day of such season, and such deer or part thereof shall not be removed or transported from such area and no part thereof shall be consumed unless it has been so

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exhibited and tagged. Such tags shall remain attached to such deer or tagged part thereof until such deer or tagged part thereof is finally consumed.

(3) It shall be unlawful for any member of the deer hunting party to hunt deer under the authority of such permit unless he is in possession of the deer tag and permit and is wearing the arm band on the sleeve of his outermost garment. The numbered arm band shall be surrendered to the officer at the time the hunting party permit deer is presented for registration.

WCD 10.12 Migratory waterfowl. (1) Prohibited Methods. (a) No person shall hunt any wild ducks, geese, coot (mudhen), rails or gallinules by shooting it or at it from any boat, canoe, raft, blind, contrivance or device in open water except as otherwise provided in this section, or from any boat or craft other than such as are propelled by paddle, oars or pole, or with the use of any decoys beyond 200 feet from the blind or covering in which the hunter is located, or leave any decoys in the water unattended, or hunt any game bird with the use of a rifle.

- (b) No person shall shoot or shoot at migratory waterfowl from any pier, dam, dock, or similar structure.
- (c) No person shall take waterfowl or coot by means, aid or use of cattle, horses or mules.
- (d) No person shall use in any manner any airplane, power boat, sailboat, or other floating craft or device for the purpose of concentrating, driving, rallying or stirring up migratory waterfowl and coot.
- (e) It shall be unlawful for any person to use in any manner any sink boat or similar blind that is or can be submerged under the water in any manner for the purpose of hunting, taking, catching, killing, molesting or shooting at any wild ducks, wild geese, coot, or any other aquatic or migratory game birds; nor shall any person occupy any blind that is being used or can be used for the purpose of taking, catching, killing or shooting at any aquatic or migratory game birds as hereinbefore mentioned after twenty minutes after the closing time prescribed for the hunting or killing of such birds, or before one hour before the opening time for the shooting of such birds.
- (2) OPEN WATER; EXCEPTIONS. (a) "Open water" is any water outside or beyond a natural growth of vegetation extending over the water surface and of such height as to offer partial or whole concealment for the hunter.
- (b) Blinds in Buffalo, Crawford, Grant, La Crosse, Pepin, Pierce, St. Croix, Trempealeau and Vernon counties. In any of the waters of the Mississippi river, the St. Croix river, Lake St. Croix and Lake Pepin, and their bays, bayous and sloughs wherein they border on the counties of Buffalo, Crawford, Grant, La Crosse, Pepin, Pierce, St. Croix, Trempealeau and Vernon and in any of the inland lakes of these counties, it shall be lawful for any person to use blinds for the purpose of taking, catching, killing and shooting at wild ducks, wild geese or other aquatic fowl that are set, placed, or located not more than 100 feet from any shoreline during the open season for such game birds. Such blinds shall in all instances be securely anchored to the place or spot where they are to be used.

Register, October, 1957, No. 22, eff. 11-1-57.

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(c) It shall be lawful for any person to hunt wild ducks, wild geese, and other aquatic fowl during the open season therefor in open water in any of the outlying waters of Lake Michigan under the jurisdiction of the state of Wisconsin excepting Green Bay and the open water area within 500 feet of any shoreline of said lake.

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- (3) BAITING. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to hunt, catch or kill any waterfowl or migratory game birds under any circumstances by the aid or use of salt or shelled or shucked or unshucked corn, wheat or other grains or other feed or means of feeding similarly used to lure, attract or entice such birds to, on, or over the area where hunters are attempting to take them.
- (b) This subsection shall not be construed to apply to propagating, scientific or other operations in accordance with the terms of lawfully issued state and federal permits, or to the taking of birds over salt blocks, properly shocked corn, standing crops (including aquatics), grains found scattered solely as a result of normal agricultural practices, flooded standing crops or flooded harvested crop lands, or to the feeding of migratory game birds at any time not in connection with hunting.
- (4) LIVE DECOYS. It shall be unlawful in the hunting of any migratory waterfowl to use directly or indirectly any live duck or live goose decoys, regardless of the distance intervening between any such live decoys and the position of the hunter.
- (5) Guns and ammunition. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, kill, hunt, or pursue any migratory bird or waterfowl with any shotgun of a larger bore than a No. 10 gauge nor shall any person take, catch, kill, hunt, pursue or shoot at any migratory birds or waterfowl with any automatic-loading or hand-operated repeating shotgun capable of holding more than three shells the magazine of which has not been cut off or plugged with a one-piece metal or wooden filler incapable of removal without disassembling the gun so as to reduce the capacity of said gun to not more than three shells at one time in the magazine and chamber combined nor by any means other than a shotgun fired from the shoulder or a bow and arrow.
- (b) No person shall have in his possession or under his control while hunting any migratory game birds any shotgun shells loaded with shot larger than No. BB.
- (c) It shall be unlawful for any person to use or have in his possession or under his control more than one gun while hunting migratory waterfowl in any manner.

- WCD 10.13 Fur-bearing animals; method of taking. (1) No person shall hunt any mink, muskrat, beaver, or otter with the aid of any spear, gun, or dog, disturb or molest any raccoon den or den trees; disturb or molest any mink den, or disturb or molest any muskrat house, muskrat feeding house, beaver house, or beaver dam, or set any trap or traps at any time within 50 feet of any beaver house or beaver dam, except during the open season for beaver, when it shall be lawful to set traps for beaver not less than 15 feet from any such beaver house, and not less than 30 feet from any such beaver dam.
- (2) No person shall set out or place any traps for fur-bearing animals, whether set or sprung, or set out or place any bait or scent for attracting fur-bearing animals thereto during the closed season for such animals.
- (3) It shall be unlawful for any person to set or reset any trap or traps or attend any trapline from sunset to one hour before sunrise.
- (4) It shall be unlawful for any person to set, place, or operate more than 75 traps of any kind for the purpose of capturing wild furbearing animals.
- (5) It shall be unlawful for any person to take, capture, or kill, or attempt to take, capture, or kill any fur-bearing animals at any time by means of water sets except during that period when and in those areas where there is an open season for trapping muskrat, beaver, or otter. A water set is any trap which is set or staked in such manner as to permit the trap or trapped animal to reach the water at any point.
- WCD 10.14 Trapping, prohibited methods. (1) No person shall set a steel-jawed trap or any trap which might kill or injure birds, on a pole, post, tree stump, or any other elevated perch more than 3 feet above the ground.
- (2) It shall be unlawful for any person to set, place, or operate any trap other than a steel-jawed trap, chain-loop trap, or live traps so constructed that not more than one animal can be taken or captured in any such trap at a single setting, for the purpose of taking, capturing, or killing fur-bearing animals.
- (3) No person shall construct or place on the ice of any of the waters of this state any artificial house or den for the purpose of taking, catching, or killing any fur-bearing animals, or place or set therein any trap or traps of any kind which might take, catch, or kill fur-bearing animals.
- WCD 10.15 Horicon National Wildlife Refuge. (1) HORICON MANAGED BOW AND ARROW DEER HUNT. (a) Deer of any age and either sex and foxes may be taken with bow and arrow only within the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge (except posted closed areas), subject to provisions of this section, beginning on December 14 and ending on December 15.
- (b) Hunting on the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge is permitted under permit (arm band) only, as authorized by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The number of permits issued at any one time shall not exceed 1,000, and a permit shall be valid for one day only. Daily hunting hours shall be from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

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(c) Hunters must form a line to apply for permits, and trailers and busses will not be permitted in line. Automobiles in the line must be occupied at all times by persons desiring to apply for permits.

(d) Hunters must apply in person for permits (arm bands) and must submit their hunting licenses and corresponding deer tag for inspection. Permits to hunt on the refuge are non-transferable.

(e) A service fee of \$1.00 per person per trip shall be paid by

each person.

- (f) When finished hunting, each hunter must surrender in person his numbered arm band at the checking station through which he entered, and then submit for examination such game as he may have bagged, not later than 5:30 p.m.
- (2) Horicon managed gun deer hunt. (a) Deer of any age and either sex and foxes may be taken with smooth-bore muzzle-loading muskets of not less than .45 caliber and shotguns loaded with single slug or ball within the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge (except posted closed areas), subject to provisions of this section, beginning on December 21 and continuing until the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service determines that the harvest of deer is such that to kill additional deer would be detrimental to and would endanger the breeding stock and future supply of deer; but not after December 22.

(b) Hunting on the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge is permitted under permit (arm band) only, as authorized by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The number of permits issued at any one time shall not exceed 250, and a permit shall be valid for one day only. In order to assure better hunter distribution, entry to the refuge shall be at designated access points only. Daily hunting

hours shall be from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

(c) Reservations. Reservations for hunting in the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge may be obtained under the following conditions.

- 1. Reservation requests by mail only on official application forms will be accepted at the Wisconsin Conservation Department, Madison. Such requests may be postmarked no earlier than 12:00 noon, Tuesday, November 5, and no later than 12:00 noon, Saturday, November 9.
- 2. Selection of mailed requests will be made by the earliest post marks.

3. A reservation will entitle the applicant to bring not more than one (1) guest with him, and will not be transferable.

4. Not more than one reservation per season may be obtained; however, hunters having made one trip may be permitted to hunt providing no other hunters are waiting in line to apply. Hunting licenses shall be marked for each trip.

5. After the opening date of the managed deer hunt, applications for permits may be made in person or by phone at the managed hunt

check stations.

6. All reservations must be exercised by 8:00 a.m.

(d) Hunters must register in person for permits (arm bands) at hunter check stations, and must submit their hunting licenses and corresponding deer tag for inspection. Arm bands to hunt on the refuge are non-transferable.

(e) Unreserved permits will be issued on a first come-first served

oasis.

(f) A service fee of \$1.00 per person per trip shall be paid by each

person.

(g) When finished hunting, each hunter must surrender in person his numbered arm band at the checking station through which he entered, and then exhibit for examination such game as he may have bagged, not later than 5:30 p.m.

(4) HORICON MANAGED GOOSE HUNT. (a) An open season is established for hunting geese on the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge in Dodge and Fond du Lac Counties, as limited herein and so provided in Section WCD 10.01 (1) (b).

The open season for hunting geese on the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge established by this section and the open season for hunting geese in Dodge and Fond du Lac Counties established in Section WCD 10.01 (1) (b) shall close on an earlier date when the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Wisconsin Conservation Commission determine that the harvest of the Canada goose population in Dodge and Fond du Lac Counties is such that to kill additional Canada geese would be detrimental to and would endanger the breeding stock and the future supply of Canada geese or that the Canada goose population has migrated from the refuge to such an extent that operation of the managed hunting unit is no longer in the public interest and such closing shall take precedence over the provisions of said sections WCD 10.01 (1) (b).

- (b) Hunting on the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge is permitted under permit only as authorized by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
- (c) Hunting on such refuge shall be done only under the following conditions:

The Horicon National Wildlife Refuge is divided into 2 units as follows:

- 1. Managed hunting unit. The managed hunting unit varies in width, but is not more than 440 yards wide as marked by single strand of wire, or as posted by the Wisconsin Conservation Department. A single row of blinds spaced approximately 200 yards apart shall be provided by the Wisconsin Conservation Department to accommodate not more than three hunters per blind.
- 2. Refuge unit. The refuge unit shall include all land in the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge not designated above as the managed hunting unit. Within this unit, it shall be unlawful to hunt in any manner at any time.
- 3. Reservations. Reservations for hunting in the managed hunting unit may be obtained under the following conditions:
- a. Reservation requests by mail only on official application forms will be accepted at the Wisconsin Conservation Department, Madison. Such requests may be postmarked no earlier than 12:00 noon, Tuesday, August 27, and no later than 12:00 noon, Sunday, September 1.
- b. Selection of mailed requests will be made by the earliest post-marks.

c. A reservation obtained by mail will be good for the applicant and not more than two (2) guests and will not be transferable.

d. Not more than three reservations per season may be obtained by mail by any one applicant, however, hunters having made three trips may be permitted to hunt providing no other hunters are waiting in line to apply. Hunting licenses shall be marked for each trip.

e. After opening date of the waterfowl season, reservations will be accepted in person or by phone at the managed hunting unit check stations. These reservations are also non-transferable.

f. All reservations for any one day will be valid only up to one-half hour before the daily shooting time.

4. Managed hunting unit prohibitions. Within the managed hunting unit it shall be unlawful to:

a. Enter without first having obtained the necessary permit (arm band) in person at one of the checking stations. Such permit shall be valid for only one day.

b. Leave the immediate vicinity of the managed hunting unit without first surrendering the permit in person at the checking station where it was obtained. The immediate vicinity of the managed hunting unit is defined as the area which is bounded by the following recognized roads:

WEST SIDE OF MARSH:

Dodge County: by county highway "I" from its junction with state highway 26, northerly to its junction with state highway 49.

Fond du Lac County: by the town road lying east of the west branch of the Rock River, which connects state highway 49 and county highway "D".

NORTH END OF MARSH:

Fond du Lac County: County highway "D" from its junction with the above mentioned town road lying east of the west branch of the Rock River, easterly to the junction with county highway "B".

EAST SIDE OF MARSH:

Fond du Lac County: County highway "B" from its junction with county highway "D" southerly to and along county highway "Z" which is in Dodge County.

Dodge County: County highway "Z" southerly to its junction with the north-south road in section 3, township 12 north, range 16 east, and southerly on said town road for a distance of one mile.

- 5. Blinds will be issued to hunters in numerical sequence in the order in which reservations are filled. Reservation confirmations will contain assigned blind number. Vacant blinds will be issued on a first come—first served basis.

READ THESE INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE FILLING OUT FORM

1. Not more than three reservations per season may be obtained by mail by any one applicant, however, hunters having made three (3) trips may be permitted to hunt provided no other hunters are waiting in line to apply. Hunting licenses shall be marked for each trip.

2. A person shall submit only one application per envelope for reservation. If the preferred date listed is not available and if the applicant will accept any other date, he will then be given

the earliest possible date.

3. Applications will be accepted only during the following postmarked period, 12:00 noon August 27, 1957, to 12:00 noon September 1, 1957. Applications which are postmarked before or after the above period will be rejected.

4. Selection of mailed requests will be made by the earliest post-

marks.

- 5. Reservations are not transferable and the person whose name appears on the reservation must present the reservation in person at the designated check station. A reservation will entitle the applicant to bring not more than two (2) guests with him. Guests need not have reservations.
- 6. All reservations for any one day will be valid only up to one-half hour before the daily shooting time. However, hunters should arrive two hours before shooting time to allow for the issuance of permits.

- 7. Blinds will be assigned to hunters in numerical sequence in the order in which reservations are issued. Reservation confirmations will show date of reservation, blind number, and check station number. The \$3.00 daily blind fee will be paid at the check station. Do not send money in advance. Vacant blinds will be issued on a first come—first served basis.
- 8. Reservations cannot be changed, once they are submitted.
- Only successful applicants will be notified. Anyone not receiving a reservation by September 24, will know he has not been successful.
- 10. The open season for hunting geese on the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge shall begin on October 15. Daily shooting hours shall be one-half hour before sunrise to 2:00 P.M.

- (5) Except as provided in section WCD 10.15 (1) (2) (3) (4) and (6), no person shall take, catch, kill, hunt, trap, or pursue in any manner any species of wild animals or birds at any time or have in possession or under control any firearm unless the same is unloaded and enclosed within a carrying case or any bow and arrow unless the same is unstrung or enclosed within a carrying case upon that area known as the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge.
- (6) Hunting and trapping. (a) In the discretion of the Fish and Wildlife Service an open season for trapping muskrat, mink, and raccoon within the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge may be declared under written permit from the Fish and Wildlife Service or its authorized representative, and with the approval of the conservation director, between the dates of October 25, 1957 and April 15, 1958. Open seasons for hunting or trapping all other fur-bearing animals within the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge may be declared in the same manner at any time during the state season on such fur-bearing animals. Such permits shall be subject to all of the rules and regulations governing hunting and trapping set forth in this chapter except that the use of not more than 125 traps and the use of wet or dry sets may be authorized by such permits.

(b) All other fur-bearing animal seasons on Horicon Marsh on both federal and state-owned areas will concur with the state season on these fur-bearers and hunting and trapping will be permitted only under permit.

- (c) It shall be unlawful for any person trapping under permit as provided in subs. (2) (a) and (b) to have in his possession or under his control while exercising the privileges of his permit any migratory waterfowl or game bird unless such waterfowl or bird shall have attached and locked through a slit in either wing thereof a metal tag furnished by the conservation commission for that purpose.
- (d) It shall be unlawful for any person trapping under permit to remove any migratory waterfowl or game bird from the federal and state-owned areas of Horicon Marsh except as follows: migratory

waterfowl and game birds taken as the result of normal trapping operation shall be delivered by the permittee to the proper federal or state agents on Horicon Marsh and such waterfowl and birds properly tagged as provided in par. (a) may be transported by the permittee for the purpose of making delivery in all townships in Dodge and Fond du Lac counties in which federal or state-owned areas of Horicon Marsh are situated.

WCD 10.16 Necedah National Wildlife Refuge, Juneau County. Except as provided in subs. (1) and (2) of this section, it shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, kill, hunt, trap, or pursue any species of wild animal or bird at any time, or have in possession or under control any firearm unless the same is unloaded and enclosed within a carrying case or any bow and arrow unless the same is unstrung or enclosed within a carrying case upon that area known as the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge in Juneau county, Wisconsin.

(1) Within the discretion of the Fish and Wildlife Service an open season for muskrats, mink, and raccoon with no bag limit and on beaver with a bag limit of 20 per season may be declared within the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge under written permit from the Fish and Wildlife Service and with the approval of the conservation director between the dates of October 25, 1957, and April 15, 1958. All other fur-bearing animal seasons on the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge, except for otter on which there shall be a closed season, shall concur with the state season on these fur-bearers and trapping shall be authorized only under permit issued by the Fish and Wildlife Service with the approval of the conservation director.

(2) There shall be an open season for deer hunting with bow and arrow only from September 21 to November 12, 1957, inclusive, and from December 14, 1957, to January 12, 1958, inclusive, one deer per season of either sex and any age, on the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge (except posted closed areas). No special permits shall be required, but hunting license and regulation deer tag as required by statutes are necessary.

WCD 10.20 Recording of deer and bear. (1) GUN SEASONS. (a) Each person who has killed a deer or bear during the open season for hunting such animals with guns shall exhibit such deer with his deer tag attached as required by s. 29.40 (1), Wis. Stats., or such bear, to a conservation warden or other authorized conservation department personnel in the county in which such deer or bear was killed or in the adjoining county not later than 10:00 p.m. of the second day following the close of such season. Such deer or bear shall be wholly intact except that it may be field-dressed. Upon approval of the officer, such officer shall attach a special tag to such deer or bear indicating that it has been inspected and recorded and such tag shall remain attached to such deer or bear until such carcass is finally consumed. Such deer or bear shall not be removed beyond the limits of the county adjoining that in which it was killed unless it has been so exhibited and tagged.

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(b) Any deer so taken in any county wherein there is an open season for hunting deer of any age, either sex, shall be exhibited and tagged as provided in par. (1) (a) in the county in which the deer was killed not later than 10:00 p.m. of the last day of such season in such county, and such deer shall not be removed from said county unless it has been so exhibited and tagged.

(c) Any deer taken on any of the islands in the outlying waters of Lake Superior in Ashland and Bayfield counties shall be exhibited and tagged not later than 10:00 p.m. of the second day following the close of such season in such county, at the registration station

in the city of Bayfield.

(d) Any deer taken in that part of Bayfield county lying north of U. S. highway "2" and east of county highway "A" shall be exhibited and tagged as provided in par. (1) (a) not later than 10:00 p.m. of the second day following the close of such season in that part of Bayfield county described herein and shall not be removed from such area unless it has been so exhibited and tagged.

(2) RECORDING OF DEER AND BEAR TAKEN DURING THE BOW AND ARROW ONLY SEASON. Each person who has killed a deer or bear during the open season for hunting such animals with bow and arrow only shall exhibit and register such deer or bear as provided in subsection 1, except that the carcass of such deer or bear shall be exhibited within 24 hours after the taking or killing thereof.

WCD 10.21 Possession of game. (1) Opening day limits. On the opening day, no person shall have in his possession or under his control more than a daily bag limit of upland game birds, gray or fox squirrels, cottontail rabbits, jackrabbits and snowshoe hares, or migratory game birds for which an open season is prescribed.

(3) Except as provided in s. 29.579, Wis. Stats., no person shall keep alive in captivity any animal or bird on which there is a closed season at any time unless a game or fur farm license has been first obtained from the state conservation commission.
