Chapter NR 20

FISHING: INLAND WATERS: OUTLYING WATERS

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(Sections 29.085 and 29.174, Stats.)

NR 20.01 Purpose; general restriction. Seasons, bag limits, possession limits and other regulations for fishing in Wisconsin waters are established in this chapter. No person may take, catch, kill or fish for fish of any variety in excess of the daily bag limit, by means other than hook and line, during other than the open season or possess or control any fish in excess of the possession limit or below the minimum size limit, except as expressly provided in this chapter.

NR 20.0125 License waiver. (1) On the third Saturday of June each year, no fishing license is required to fish the inland or outlying waters.

(2) The license waiver of sub. (1) does not apply to commercial fishing license requirements.

NR 20.015 Definitions. For the purpose of this chapter, the following terms are defined as follows:

- (1) "Artificial fly" means a single hook dressed with fur, feathers, hair, silk, tinsel, thread or similar material to imitate the natural food of trout.
- (2) "Artificial lure" means a bait designed to attract fish which does not include any natural bait.
 - (3) "Fisher" means any person engaged in fishing.
- (4) "Fishing" includes taking, capturing or killing fish or fishing for fish of any variety at any time in the waters of the state.
- (4g) "Setline" means a line with one or more hooks fastened to it and designed to be set or left unattended in the water for the purpose of taking fish.

- (4t) "Set or bank pole" means a pole equipped with line with one or more hooks fastened to it, designed to be used for fishing from the banks of lakes or rivers and set or left unattended.
- (5) "Telemetry device" means any device attached or implanted in fish that transmits a sonic or electronic signal to aid in fishing.

NR 20.02 Waters classified; hook and line fishing in outlying waters. (1) For the purpose of regulating hook and line fishing in the outlying waters, the closed seasons, size limits, bag and possession limits, number of hooks and lines and ice fishing regulations shall be the same as those prescribed for the inland waters of the county in which such outlying waters are located, except as otherwise specifically provided in the following table:

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- h. Waterloo (Maunesha) creek beginning at the dam (Malthouse) at Waterloo in Jefferson county downstream to its confluence with the Crawfish river, Dodge county.
 - 18. Rubicon river in Dodge county.
 - 19. Shioc river in Outagamie county.
- 20. Waupaca river in Waupaca county beginning at the dam at Weyauwega downstream to the Wolf river.
- 21. White river below dam at Burlington to Fox river in Racine county.
 - 22. Wildcat river in Dodge county.
- 23. Willow river in Waushara county beginning at the dam at Auroraville downstream to Lake Poygan.
- 24. Wisconsin river including all sloughs, bayous and flowages from the St. Regis dam in Rhinelander, Oneida county, downstream to the Burlington Northern railroad bridge in Crawford and Grant counties and streams in Columbia county flowing into the Wisconsin river from their mouths upstream to the first highway bridge, except the Baraboo river which has the year round season for its entire length.
- 25. Wolf river in Winnebago, Waupaca and Outagamie counties and in Shawano county upstream to the dam in the city of Shawano.
- 26. Yellow river including all sloughs, bayous and flowages from the highway 54 dam at Dexterville, Wood county, downstream to its confluence with the Castle Rock flowage in Juneau county.
 - 27. Yellowstone river from the dam downstream in Lafayette county.
- (b) The department shall open the season for fishing with dip nets in any waters when it finds after scientific investigation and study that the fish populations in such waters are threatened with imminent mortality because of depletion of dissolved oxygen or other adverse habitat conditions under which fish will not survive. During such open season all species of fish may be taken by means of dip nets not more than 3 feet in diameter or 3 feet square, but no person shall have more than 25 pounds and one fish of any species of game fish of any size so taken in his possession. No person shall fish with more than one such dip net. Such open season shall be put into effect by posting a notice thereof on or in the vicinity of the shore of the waters affected, such posting being deemed by the department to be the most feasible way of notifying the public that such open season for fishing with dip nets is in effect. Such open season shall remain in full force and effect only so long as such waters are covered with ice and so long as such posting is continued.
- (c) Except for streams posted pursuant to ch. NR 26, there shall be no closed season for hook and line fishing for any species of fish except sturgeon, smallmouth bass and largemouth bass on any stream tributary to Lake Michigan or Green Bay, upstream to the first dam or lake except the Kewaunee river where this rule applies upstream to the third county highway "C" bridge.
- (d) Except as provided in subds. 1. and 2., the bag limits, the minimum size limits and regulations governing trout and salmon fishing as set forth

in this chapter apply to the waters of Lake Michigan, Green Bay and any stream which is tributary to Lake Michigan or Green Bay, upstream to the first dam or lake except the Kewaunee river where this rule applies upstream to the third county highway "C" bridge.

- 1. During the period from October 1 to but not including the first Saturday in May of the following May, annually, upstream to the first dam or lake on any stream tributary to Lake Michigan or Green Bay, except the Kewaunee river where this rule applies upstream to the third county hwy. "C" bridge, the minimum size of trout and salmon shall be 10 inches and the daily bag limit shall be 5 fish in the aggregate, of which only 3 may be lake trout. During such period, hook and line fishing is restricted to baits using a hook with a gape size not larger than one-half inch from point to shank. During such period, fishing with hook and line is prohibited between one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise on all streams tributary to Lake Michigan and Green Bay except the Menominee, Oconto (including tributaries) and Fox rivers.
- 2. During the period from October 1 to November 15, a person may take trout and salmon by hand without the use of any device and by foul hooking or snagging while fishing with hook and line, using a hook with a gape size of not larger than one-half inch from point to shank, in the following waters only. During such period fishing by hand and hook and line on the following waters is prohibited between one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise, except in the Menominee river. The size limit on trout and salmon shall be 10 inches and the daily bag limit shall be 5 fish in the aggregate, of which only 3 may be lake trout.
- b. Door county Sturgeon Bay ship canal, excluding areas within 500 feet of Strawberry creek, from the Lake Michigan shoreline westerly to the Michigan street bridge.
- c. Kenosha county Pike river upstream to the first dam, and the Lake Michigan shoreline while fishing from shore from the mouth of the Pike river northward a distance of one-half mile.
- d. Kewaunee county Kewaunee river upstream to the third county highway C bridge crossing. Ahnapee river upstream to 500 feet below the Forestville dam.
- e. Manitowoc county East Twin river from the 17th Street bridge in the city of Two Rivers upstream to the first dam, West Twin river from the Washington Street bridge in the city of Two Rivers upstream to the first dam, and the Little Manitowoc river upstream from the East Cleveland Avenue bridge in the city of Manitowoc.
- f. Marinette county all streams tributary to Green Bay upstream to the first dam.
- g. Milwaukee county Kinnickinnic river, Menomonee river, Milwaukee river, Oak creek, all upstream to the first dam.
- h. Oconto county all named and unnamed streams tributary to Green Bay, other than the Oconto river and its tributaries, upstream to the first dam, and the waters of Green Bay. There is no snagging season on the Oconto river and its tributaries.
- (4) EXPERIMENTAL WATERS; PERMITS; REPORTS. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch or kill fish or fish for fish in the waters of

Nebish, Spruce, Mystery, Escanaba and Pallette lakes situated in sections 34 and 35, township 42 north, range 7 east, and sections 1, 2, 3, 10, 11 and 12, township 41 north, range 7 east, Vilas county except under the following conditions:

- 1. Fishing in such waters is authorized only under permit, which may be secured at the checking stations indicated by posted signs in the immediate area.
- 2. Fishing in such waters is restricted to hook and line or rod and reel with fishing in Spruce lake further restricted to the use of artificial lures only and except that cisco may be taken in Pallette lake by means of dip nets or seines described under s. NR 20.11 (2).
- 3. The provisions of this section shall apply to such waters throughout the year.
- 4. All permits are valid only for the date issued and shall be turned in at the checking stations at the termination of each day's fishing activities by the fisher.
- 5. There is a continuous open season with no daily bag limit or size limit for all species of fish contained in these waters except in Nebish lake there shall be a 10-inch minimum size limit for smallmouth bass, no open season through 1991 for lake trout in Pallette lake and a 12-inch minimum size limit with a 2 daily bag limit on largemouth bass in Spruce lake.
- 6. All fish taken pursuant to this section shall be exhibited to the department or its agents at the checking station for examination, identification and marking.
- (5) FLY FISHING ONLY. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, or kill fish, or fish for fish by any means other than the use of an artificial fly by the method commonly known as "fly fishing" in the following described waters:
- 1. Peshtigo river—In, on or along that part of the Peshtigo river lying in Marinette county, beginning at the Johnson Falls dam in the SW 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of section 32, township 33 north, range 19 east and extending downstream to the foot of Spring Rapids in the SE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of section 15, township 32 north, range 19 east, with a daily bag limit of 5 trout and a minimum size limit of 10 inches on trout.
- 2. Wolf river—In, on or along that part of the Wolf river lying in Langlade county, beginning at the railroad trestle in section 19, township 32 north, range 14 east extending downstream to the eastwest quarter line dividing the west half of section 33, township 32 north, range 14 east marked by a road which runs along side the Diercks irrigation pond with a daily bag limit of 5 trout per day and a minimum size limit of 10 inches on trout.
- (b) For the purpose of this section, an artificial fly means a single hook dressed with fur, feathers, hair, silk, tinsel, thread or similar material to imitate the natural food of trout.
- (6) Except as otherwise specifically provided in this section, the open and closed seasons and other regulations established by this chapter shall apply to the area described herein.

- (7) EXPERIMENTAL TROUT STREAMS. For the purpose of this section no person may take, catch or kill fish, or fish for fish by any means other than the use of an artificial fly by the method commonly known as "fly fishing" and with the use of artificial lures on the following streams:
- (a) Castle Rock creek In, on or along that part of Castle Rock creek, Grant county, from the Church road bridge in the NW 1/4 SE 1/2, section 36, T7N, R2W, downstream to the county trunk Q bridge in the NE 1/4 NE 1/4, section 31, T7N, R1W.
- 1. Castle Rock Springs In, on or along the springhead and spring tributary of Castle Rock creek in the SW 1/4 NE 1/4, section 36, T7N, R2W, Grant county.
- 2. Doc Smith creek In, on or along that part of Doc Smith creek, Grant county, from and including the SE 1/4 NE 1/4, section 1, T6N, R2W, downstream to its mouth (Castle Rock creek).
- 3. There is a 0 bag limit for trout and the open season is from January 1 to September 30, both dates inclusive.
- (b) Race-Willow creek In, on or along that part of Race-Willow creek, St. Croix county, known as the Race in the SW 1/4 SW 1/4 and the SE 1/4 SW 1/4, section 8; SW 1/4 NW 1/4, NW 1/4 NW 1/4, and the NE 1/4 NW 1/4, section 17; and the SE 1/4 NE 1/4, section 18, T29N, R19W, a trout daily bag limit of one fish is established, the minimum size limit of which shall be 13 inches. The open season is the first Saturday in May beginning at 5:00 a.m. through September 30, both dates inclusive.
- (c) Trout creek In, on or along the entire length of Trout creek, Iowa county no trout may be kept unless they are under 14 inches or 18 inches and over in length, but only one trout 18 inches or over may be kept. There is no minimum size limit. The open season and other bag limits established in s. NR 20.03 (1) (f) 1. apply.
- (d) Namekagon river In, on or along that part of the Namekagon river, Sawyer county, from section 3, T42N, R8W, downstream through section 31, T42N, R8W, no trout between 10 and 15 inches in length may be kept. The open season, minimum size and bag limits established in s. NR 20.03 (1) (f) 7. apply.
- (e) Paradise Springs creek In, on or along that part of Paradise Springs creek, Waukesha county, beginning at county hwy. N. bridge in Eagle (section 16, T5N, R17E) and extending upstream 800 feet to the creed origin including the headwater pond. There is a 0 bag limit and the fishing for fun season is from January 1 to September 30.
- (f) Plover river In, on or along that part of the Plover river, Marathon county, in section 15, T29N, R10E, from the hwy. "Z" bridge upstream to the Totten Springs outlet there is a 13 inch minimum size limit on brook trout. Except for the 13 inch minimum size limit on brook trout, the open season, bag limits and size limits established in s. NR 20.03 (1) (f) 3. apply.
- (g) Timber Coulee creek In, on or along that part of Timber Coulee creek, Vernon county, from Olstad road located in NE¼ NW¼, section 3, [2] T14N, R5W, downstream for approximately one mile through the NE¼ NE¼, section 3, T14N, R5W, only trout between 14 and 17 inches

may be kept. The daily bag limit is one fish and the open season is from the first Saturday in May at 5:00 a.m. to September 30.

- (8) EXPERIMENTAL MANAGED LAKES (ponds). (a) Bayfield and Lincoln counties. 1. The following lakes (ponds) shall be open for trout fishing on even year dates only.
 - b. Blaisdell, Bayfield
 - c. Mimi, Bayfield
 - d. Nymphia, Bayfield
 - e. Arnent, Lincoln
- 2. The following lakes (ponds) shall be open for trout fishing on odd year dates only.
 - a. Balsam, Bayfield
 - b. Beaver, Bayfield
 - c. Little Star, Bayfield
 - d. Spring, Bayfield
 - e. Tahoe, Lincoln
- (b) The open and closed seasons, bag limits, and minimum lengths set out in s. NR 20.03 (1) (f) apply to waters listed in this subsection to the extent that this subsection does not provide a different season, bag limit or minimum length.
- (c) In McGee lake, Langlade county, there shall be an open season for trout from the first Saturday in May at 5:00 a.m. to and including September 30. A daily bag limit of 2 trout with a no size limit shall be in effect. Fishing is restricted to the use of artificial lures or flies only.
- (d) In Little Bass lake (sec. 15, T39N, R7E), Oneida county and Wildwood lake, Vilas county there is a 12-inch minimum size limit for smallmouth and largemouth bass and all trout. Only artificial lures and flies may be used. The use of live or dead bait of any kind is prohibited. The daily bag limit is 5 fish for each species and the open season is from the first Saturday in May through November 15.

- NR 20.06 Prohibited fishing under particular conditions. (1) (a) Waters and methods. No person shall take, capture, or kill fish of any variety or fish for fish during the closed season for trout in streams and creeks containing trout except that rough fish may be taken by hand.
- (b) Trolling. No person may fish in the inland waters of the state from a motor-driven boat when the motor is running or from any boat in tow of a motor-driven boat when the motor is running or from any sailboat when in motion; or by means of shutting or drawing off water for that purpose. Casting and immediate retrieval of a bait or lure while positioning a boat by means of an electric motor, where motors are permitted, is not trolling. The restrictions in this paragraph do not apply to the waters of Barron, Bayfield, Burnett, Douglas, Polk, Racine, Rusk, Taylor, Washburn and Waukesha counties, the Wisconsin river from county trunk A east of Tomahawk, Lincoln county, downstream, except Lake Mohawksin the Chippewa river including sloughs, bayous and flowages up to the flowing portion of all tributary streams from the Holcombe flowage, Chippewa county, downstream, the Fox river from Buffalo lake downstream to the DePere dam and the following named lakes and rivers including their flowages and sloughs:

aquatic insects in or from any stream or spring hole tributary thereto inhabited by trout. A licensed fisherman may take such larvae or nymphs from trout streams by hand during the trout season for his immediate personal use as bait in the stream from which taken and no such larvae or nymphs may be carried away from the stream from which taken.

- (4) INLAND WATERS. (a) Unless a bait permit has been issued by the district director in accordance with gear regulations in s. 29.30, Stats., only the following described gear may be used for the taking of minnows for bait:
- 1. Minnow seines. Minnow seines may not exceed 35 feet in length and shall contain mesh not to exceed one-half inch stretch measure.
- 2. Minnow dip nets. Minnow dip nets shall be defined as follows: A piece of netting suspended from a round or square frame not to exceed 8 feet in diameter or 8 feet square.
- 3. Minnow traps. Minnow traps shall be of a length not greater than 24 inches and of a width not greater than 16 inches square or in diameter with an opening in the throat of the trap not larger than 1½ inches in diameter. The traps shall have securely attached to them a label or tag clearly bearing in the English language the name and address of the operator. All minnow traps shall be raised and the minnows removed from them at least once in every 48 hours from all waters, except department designated trout waters as indicated in department publications or under s. NR 1.02 (7). On designated trout waters, traps shall be raised and emptied every 24 hours during the open season for trout on the water, and during the closed season on such water, as required in the department permit authorizing placement of the trap.
- (b) Unless a permit has been issued by the department, no person may use minnow seines or minnow dip nets of any type or description in inland streams or tributary spring holes inhabited by trout. Licensed bait dealers may use no more than a total of 20 minnow traps when removing minnows from one or more trout streams during the open season for trout, unless a permit has been issued. Persons not possessing a bait dealers license may use no more than a total of 3 minnow traps when conducting such removal. During the closed trout season, minnows may not be removed except by licensed bait dealers as authorized by permit.
- (c) It shall be unlawful for any person, except bait dealers licensed pursuant to s. 29.137, Stats., to have in possession or under control more than 600 minnows at any time.

NR 20.11 Whitefish and cisco in inland waters. (1) The rules and regulations set forth in this section shall apply to the use of all nets and seines used for taking whitefish and cisco.

- (2) Cisco dip nets shall not exceed 8 feet in diameter or 8 feet square and such seines shall not exceed 75 feet in length or 6 feet in depth and with a mesh not greater than 2 inches stretch measure.
- (3) (a) The open season for fishing whitefish and cisco with such dip nets and seines in all inland waters except Lake Lucerne in Forest county shall be from the Saturday nearest October 10 to February 1.
- (b) Dip nets only may be used for the taking of whitefish and cisco from Keyes lake in Florence county with a daily bag limit of 3 fish from the Saturday nearest October 10 to January 15.
- (4) No person shall have in possession or under control at any time more than 25 pounds and one fish in aggregate of whitefish or cisco taken from inland waters.

- NR 20.12 Setlines and set or bank poles in inland waters. (1) LICENSE REQUIRED. No person may use, set, lift, attend or have in possession while on the inland waters any set or bank pole or setline unless its use complies with this section and is authorized by a set or bank pole license issued under s. 29.36 (1), Stats., or by a setline license issued under s. 29.37 (1), Stats.
- (2) General requirements. (a) A set or bank pole license authorizes the use of a maximum of 5 set or bank poles and a setline license authorizes the use of one setline except as provided in ss. NR 21.12 (1) (a) and 22.12 (1).
- (b) No person may use, set, lift, attend or have in possession while on the inland waters any set or bank pole or any setline licensed to another person.
- (c) No person may possess sport angling equipment while setting, lifting or attending a set or bank pole or setline.
- (3) SETLINE FLAG. Setline flags and buoys shall meet the requirements of this subsection.
- (a) Any person using a setline shall place and maintain at one end of the setline a white flag 10 inches square or larger held by a staff or pole 3 feet or more above the surface of the water or bank, but the flag may not be placed in the main channel of any navigable waterway.
- (b) The flag shall be numbered with figures which are at least 3 inches high and which correspond to the number of the license authorizing the setline's use.
- (c) The flag staff or pole may not be more than 2½ inches in diameter and the portion of the staff extending above the water or bank shall be banded horizontally with alternate black and white markings of 2 inches to 6 inches wide.
- (d) When a buoy is used to hold the setline's flag staff or pole the buoy shall be cylindrical in shape, have a diameter of 15 inches or less, and be
