Ag 24.01 Definition. The alfalfa weevil (Hypera postica Gyll.) is a seriously injurious insect not now known to be distributed in the state of Wisconsin. Its introduction into this state would result in serious loss and damage.

Ag 24.02 Where found. The alfalfa weevil is known to be distributed as an insect pest in the following named states:

Nevada Pennsylvania California New Jersey South Dakota New Mexico Colorado Utah Delaware New York Virginia North Carolina Idaho Washington Maryland North Dakota West Virginia Montana Oregon Wyoming Nebraska

and such states are hereby declared to be infested.

Ag 24.03 Shipping requirements. No person shall ship or bring into Wisconsin any alfalfa meal, hay of any kind, or cereal straw which has been grown or stored in any infested area without conforming to the following requirements:

- (1) Hay and straw from infested areas may be admitted into Wisconsin only when accompanied by a certificate of a state or federal inspector that (a) the product is free from alfalfa weevil and (b) the vehicle or container was thoroughly cleaned before loading. If the product is chopped alfalfa hay the certificate must also state that the vehicle or container was thoroughly cleaned before loading and that, under the supervision of the inspector, the hay was blown into the vehicle or container through a blower of at least 2100 R.P.M. Nonfumigated chopped alfalfa hay may enter Wisconsin only during the period from December 1 to March 15 each year.
- (2) Alfalfa meal from infested areas may be admitted into Wisconsin only when accompanied by a certificate of a state or federal inspector that (a) the mill grinding the product is accredited by the quarantine officer of the state of origin as free from infestation, (b) the meal was shipped immediately after milling or, if stored, that the warehouse is free of infestation, (c) only new or reclaimed bags were used in sacking the meal, and (d) the vehicle or container was thoroughly cleaned before loading.
- Ag 24.06 Funigation. Any of the regulated products may be admitted into Wisconsin if accompanied by a certificate of a state or federal inspector stating that (1) it was funigated with methyl bromide at the rate of 2½ pounds per 1,000 cu. ft. at 70° F. for 12 hours or by some other specified treatment of equivalent lethal results, and (2) that such funigation was affected in the vehicle or Register, August, 1956, No. 8.
