

## EXECUTIVE ORDER #59

Proclamation of a State of Emergency and Order to Limited Service of the Wisconsin National Guard

WHEREAS, a great number of highway deaths and injuries have in the past occurred on Memorial Day weekend; and

WHEREAS, an unconscionable number of citizens will be killed or injured on Wisconsin highways during the Memorial Day weekend unless all available resources are utilized to support the highway safety effort;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, TOMMY G. THOMPSON, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Wisconsin, do hereby declare and proclaim a

to exist in Wisconsin starting at 12:00 noon, Friday, May 26, 1989, until 8:00 pm, Monday, May 29, 1989, and urge all motorists traveling on Wisconsin highways to exercise extreme caution during this period to assist in reducing highway accidents as well as use other safety measures, which should be undertaken any time a vehicle is operated on the road, such as fastening safety belts and driving only while alert.

FURTHER, under the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of this State, I hereby order into state service sufficient persons and equipment of the Wisconsin National Guard as are necessary to assist the Wisconsin State Patrol and local law enforcement agencies in the performance of their duties by providing medical assistance and the performance of their duties by providing medical assistance and evacuation of the injured during this critical period and direct that expenses of the same be paid for as provided in Wis. Stat. s.20.465(1)(c).
