EXECUTIVE ORDER #237

Relating to a Proclamation that the Flag of the United States and the Flag of the State of Wisconsin Be Flown at Half-Staff as a Mark of Respect for former State Representative James Soletski

WHEREAS, on August 20, 2024, former State Representative James Soletski passed away at the age of 75;

WHEREAS, in 2006, after a career of more than 20 years in the energy industry, State Representative Soletski was elected to the Wisconsin State Assembly, where he served for two terms representing the 88th Assembly District;

WHEREAS, during his time in the Wisconsin State Assembly, State Representative Soletski served as chairperson of the Energy and Utilities Committee, as well as vice-chairperson of the Elections and Campaign Reform Committee and the Consumer Protection Committee;

WHEREAS, a lifelong Wisconsinite, State Representative Soletski will be remembered for his dedication to service and his principles, and his quick wit;

WHEREAS, the people of Wisconsin join State Representative Soletski's family, friends, and colleagues in honoring his life and the many contributions he made to the state of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, services for former State Representative Soletski will take place on Thursday, August 29, 2024, in Green Bay, Wisconsin.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, TONY EVERS, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the Laws of the State, hereby order that the flag of the United States and the flag of the State of Wisconsin shall be flown at half-staff at all buildings, grounds, and military installations of the State of Wisconsin, beginning at sunrise on August 29, 2024, and ending at sunset on that date.
