EXECUTIVE ORDER #265

Relating to a Proclamation that the Flag of the United States and the Flag of the State of Wisconsin Be Flown at Half-Staff as a Mark of Respect for former Oneida Nation Chairman Gerald L. "Jerry" Danforth

WHEREAS, on June 1, 2025, former Oneida Nation Chairman Gerald L. "Jerry" Danforth passed away at the age of 78;

WHEREAS, Chairman Danforth served in the United States Navy for more than 30 years, retiring in 1994 as force master chief of the Naval Surface Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, having served in both Vietnam and Desert Storm;

WHEREAS, first elected in 1999, then returning to office in 2005, Danforth served two full terms as chairman of the Oneida Nation of Wisconsin;

WHEREAS, during his administration, Chairman Danforth worked diligently to strengthen Tribal gaming interests and economic development and prioritized issues around healthcare, higher education, and Oneida language preservation;

WHEREAS, the people of Wisconsin join former Chairman Danforth's family, friends, and the entire Oneida Nation in mourning his passing and honoring his courage, character, and commitment to service; and

WHEREAS, services for former Oneida Nation Chairman Danforth will take place on Saturday, June 7, 2025, in Oneida, Wisconsin.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, TONY EVERS, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the Laws of the State, hereby order that the flag of the United States and the flag of the State of Wisconsin shall be flown at half-staff at all buildings, grounds, and military installations of the State of Wisconsin, beginning at sunrise on **Saturday, June 7, 2025,** and ending at sunset on that date.
