| 2011 Senate Bill 410 | Senate Substitute <br> Amendment 1 |
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Under current law, with limited exceptions, no person may operate upon a highway any vehicle or combination of vehicles that exceeds certain statutory weight limits unless the person obtains a permit issued by the Department of Transportation or a local authority.

2011 Senate Bill 410 creates an exception to the permit requirement, similar to the present seasonal exception for vehicles transporting agricultural crops, for certain overweight vehicles hauling manure. Under the bill, a vehicle or combination of vehicles transporting manure to or from a farm between September $1^{\text {st }}$ and November $30^{\text {th }}$ of each year may operate without an overweight permit if the vehicle or combination of vehicles exceeds the weight limits by not more than $15 \%$ and the vehicle is either: (a) a vehicle or combination of vehicles having a registered weight of 50,000 pounds or more; or (b) an implement of husbandry. The bill would not apply to the national system of interstate highways, except on I-39 between US-H 51 and I-90/94.

Senate Substitute Amendment 1 makes the following changes to the bill. It extends the weight limit exception to December $31^{\text {st }}$ of each year and provides that the exception would not apply to the national system of interstate highways, including I-39 between US-H 51 and I-90/94.

## Legislative History

Senate Substitute Amendment 1 was offered by Senator Galloway on February 9, 2012. On February 16, 2012 the Senate Committee on Transportation and Elections unanimously recommended adoption of Senate Amendment 1 and passage of Senate Bill 410, as amended.

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
