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#### 2021 Assembly Bill 754

#### Assembly Amendment 1

## 2021 ASSEMBLY BILL 754

2021 Assembly Bill 754 makes changes to the lobbying laws as recommended by the Wisconsin Ethics Commission. Very generally, the bill includes the following provisions:

- Allows an agency official, elective state official, or legislative employee to attend meetings to discuss government proposals and issues without paying admission, a practice referred to as a "Lobby Day."
- Eliminates a requirement in current law that the Ethics Commission submit weekly reports on licensed lobbyists to the Legislature.
- Allows the Ethics Commission to notify lobbyists and principals of missing lobbying reports by electronic mail, in addition to mail.
- Allows a lobbyist to use a primary address when applying for a lobbying license and to keep that address confidential under Wisconsin's open records law.
- Includes a school district administrator in the definition of "local public office" for purposes of the local code of ethics.<sup>1</sup> A school district administrator means a school district superintendent, supervising principal, or other person who acts as the administrative head of a school district.

## ASSEMBLY AMENDMENT 1

Assembly Amendment 1 amends the definition of "local public office." Under the amendment, the following positions are included in that definition, and are therefore subject to the local code of ethics:

- An employee of a school district who holds a school administrator license or permit issued by the Department of Public Instruction under rules promulgated pursuant to s. 118.19, Stats.,<sup>2</sup> and whose employment requires that the individual hold that license or permit.
- An employee of a school district who acts as the head of facilities and maintenance and whose employment duties include making purchasing decisions or recommendations for the school district.

## **BILL HISTORY**

Representative Wichgers introduced Assembly Amendment 1 on January 31, 2022. On February 1, 2022, the Assembly Committee on State Affairs recommended adoption of the bill and passage of the bill, as amended, on votes of Ayes, 12; Noes, 0.
