

1995 SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 54

March 5, 1996 – Introduced by Senators Zien, Fitzgerald, Breske, Burke and Moen, cosponsored by Representatives Musser, Zukowski, Dobyns, Lorge, Baldus, Seratti, Ourada, Olsen, Freese, Hahn, Silbaugh, Goetsch, Turner, F. Lasee, Green, Ladwig, Wirch and Baldwin. Referred to Special committee on State and Federal Relations.

1	Relating to: urging Congress and the President to enact legislation to confer
2	national monument status on the National Native American Vietnam Veterans
3	Memorial at "The Highground".
4	Whereas, the National Native American Vietnam Veterans Memorial was
5	dedicated at The Highground on September 16, 1995; and
6	Whereas, the National Native American Vietnam Veterans Memorial was
7	dedicated in honor of the "Forgotten Warriors" across the country who are missing
8	in action or who died as a result of their military service in Vietnam; and
9	Whereas, the names of 241 Native American casualties from all 50 states and
10	Canada are listed on granite monuments at this memorial; and
11	Whereas, Vietnam veterans come from diverse cross-cultural backgrounds and
12	share a commonality of experiences; and
13	Whereas, Native American Vietnam veterans see themselves as an
14	underserved and unrecognized segment of the veteran population; and
15	Whereas, the Ho-Chunk Wazijaci Indian Nation has requested state
16	sponsorship of that Indian Nation's efforts to have national monument status

Resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That the Wisconsin legislature hereby respectfully urges the Congress of the United States and the President of the United States to enact legislation to confer national monument status on the National Native American Vietnam Veterans Memorial at The Highground; and, be it further

Resolved, That the senate chief clerk shall provide a copy of this joint resolution to all members of the Wisconsin delegation to Congress, the presiding officers of the U.S. house of representatives and the U.S. senate and the President of the United States.
