## 1997 ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION 21

March 24, 1998 – Introduced by Representatives Bock, R. Young, Boyle, Krug, Plouff, Notestein, Robson and Seratti. Referred to Committee on Rules.

**Relating to:** memorializing Congress to close the School of the Americas. 1 2 Whereas, the School of the Americas was established in Panama in 1946 and 3 is presently located in Fort Benning, Georgia; and 4 Whereas, the School of the Americas has trained over 59,000 troops from Latin 5 America and the Caribbean since its inception in 1946 and currently trains 900 to 6 2,000 such soldiers per year at Fort Benning, Georgia, at an annual cost to the 7 American Taxpayers of nearly \$20,000,000; and 8 Whereas, it has been admitted that training manuals used for years by the 9 School of the Americas have advocated execution, false imprisonment, physical 10 abuse and other forms of torture; and Whereas, many School of the Americas graduates have been involved in a wide 11 12 range of human rights abuses; and 13 Whereas, 2 of the 3 Salvadoran officers cited as being responsible for the 1980 assassination of Archbishop Oscar Romero were School of the Americas graduates, 14

including death squad founder and leader Robert D'Aubuisson; and

1 Whereas, 10 of the 12 officers cited as being involved in the massacre of 900  $\mathbf{2}$ civilians at El Mozote in El Salvador graduated from the School of the Americas; and 3 Whereas, 19 of the 26 officers cited in the November 1989 murder of 6 Jesuit 4 priests, their housekeeper and her daughter in San Salvador, El Salvador, were 5 School of the Americas graduates; and 6 Whereas, Guatemalan Colonel Julio Roberto Alpirez, a CIA asset who was 7 implicated in the killings of U.S. citizen Michael Devine and Efraim Bamaca, 8 husband of U.S. lawyer Jennifer Harbury, is a School of the Americas graduate; and 9 Whereas, the editorial boards of the Asbury Park Press, Atlanta Constitution, Bangor Daily News, Boston Globe, Cleveland Plain Dealer, Courier News, Des Moines 10 Register, New York Times, San Antonio Express-News and Syracuse Post-Standard, 11 among others, have called for the closure of the School of the Americas; and 12 13 Whereas, the New York Times, in its September 28, 1996, edition stated, "an 14 institution ... [the School of the Americas] so clearly out of tune with American values 15 ... should be shut down without delay"; and 16 Whereas, the California chapter of the Veterans of Foreign Wars has passed a 17 resolution urging the closure of the School of the Americas, and the national organization is deliberating the same resolution; and 18 19 Whereas, there is growing opposition to the School of the Americas in the U.S. 20 house of representatives; and 21Whereas, in September 1997 the U.S. house of representatives came within 7 22 votes (210-217) of passing an amendment to the 1998 Foreign Aid Appropriations 23 Bill that would have cut \$1,500,000 from the school's funding; and 24 Whereas, the U.S. house of representatives' vote represents a sharp contrast to

votes in 1993 and 1994, when the school's reputation was not as widely known and

1	when amendments to cut the school's funding were defeated by 82-vote and 42-vote
2	margins; and
3	Whereas, among the Wisconsin delegation to Congress there was recently
4	nearly unanimous support of an amendment to the appropriations bill that would
5	significantly cut the school's funding, 3 Republicans and 5 Democrats voting in favor
6	of the amendment and none voting against it; now, therefore, be it
7	Resolved by the assembly, That the Wisconsin assembly urges the President
8	and the Congress of the United States to support the closure of the United States
9	Army School of the Americas; and, be it further
10	Resolved, That the assembly chief clerk shall provide copies of this resolution
11	to President Clinton and to each member of this state's congressional delegation.
