



2011 ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION 23

March 9, 2012 – Introduced by Representatives PASCH and BERNARD SCHABER. Referred to Committee on Rules.

Relating to: honoring the Crisis Intervention Team program. 1 2 Whereas, the first Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) program was developed in 3 1988 in Memphis in response to a tragic incident involving an individual 4 experiencing a mental health crisis; and $\mathbf{5}$ Whereas, CIT programs are based on training police departments with the 6 necessary skills and understanding to identify and provide the most effective and 7 compassionate response possible to situations involving people in mental health 8 crisis; and Whereas, by participating in CIT programs, police departments nationwide 9 10 have experienced less need for the use of lethal force, less officer injuries, less injuries to individuals in mental health crisis, and a decrease in involuntary commitments; 11 12and Whereas, Milwaukee and Appleton area police officers joined forces with their 13 14local National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) chapters and numerous 15community mental health experts to learn how to defuse such situations; and

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1	Whereas, during CIT training mental health experts teach police officers how
2	to recognize a diverse range of mental illnesses and react appropriately to each
3	unique situation; and
4	Whereas, due to the CIT training that they received, law enforcement officers
5	have deescalated countless situations involving individuals with mental illnesses,
6	preventing injury and saving the lives of many; and
7	Whereas, because of the success of the CIT program, NAMI of Greater
8	Milwaukee developed the Crisis Intervention Partner (CIP), a shorter version of the
9	program that is offered to anyone working with individuals with mental illnesses,
10	including social workers, teachers, emergency room technicians, and correctional
11	officers; and
12	Whereas, the CIT program encourages communities and police departments to
13	come together for the common goals of safety, understanding, and service to
14	individuals with mental illnesses and their families; and
15	Whereas, by offering an immediate, calm approach, CIT reduces the likelihood
16	of physical confrontations and creates an opportunity to provide better patient care,
17	which often leads to increased treatment continuity with community providers; and
18	Whereas, the implementation and success of CIT programs indicate a shifting
19	in law enforcement from traditional police responses to a more safe and respectful
20	treatment of individuals experiencing mental health crisis; and
21	Whereas, hundreds of police officers across our state have been trained in crisis
22	intervention and our communities as a whole have greatly benefitted from these
23	programs since their inception; now, therefore, be it
24	Resolved by the assembly, That the assembly honors the Crisis Intervention
25	Team program for its invaluable training and for providing our brave police officers

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with the skills and knowledge they need to safely approach situations in whichindividuals are experiencing mental health crisis.
