PREFACE

The Joint Legislative Council General Report to the 2023-24 Legislature is prepared pursuant to s. 13.81 (3), Stats. The report summarizes the work of the Joint Legislative Council from June 1, 2022 to May 31, 2024, and the work of the statutory and study committees established by the council that reported to the Joint Legislative Council.

The Joint Legislative Council continued two statutory committees and established six study committees to conduct various studies and to make reports to the 2023-24 Legislature. [See list on page 1 of Part I.]

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Part I – Work of the 2022-23 Joint Legislative Council

JOINT LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

The Joint Legislative Council held one meeting between January 1, 2022 and May 31, 2024 (the period covered by this report), on the following date:

• March 23, 2023.

The proposals introduced by the Joint Legislative Council and the Law Revision Committee are discussed in Part II of this report.

Council Study Committees

During the period covered by this report, two statutory committees and six study committees met and reported to the 2023-24 Joint Legislative Council.

Organization and Activities of the Joint Legislative Council

Twenty-two legislators serve on the Joint Legislative Council: 11 from the Senate; and 11 from the Assembly. Twelve of these members are *ex officio* and serve on the Council because of their positions as legislative leaders. These members are: the speaker of the Assembly; the president of the Senate; the speaker pro tempore of the Assembly; president pro tempore of the Senate; the majority and minority leaders of the Assembly and Senate; the two co-chairs of the Joint Committee on Finance (JCF); and the ranking minority member of JCF from each house. The other 10 members are appointed in the same manner as members of standing committees are appointed: five are appointed by the chair of the Senate Committee on Organization; and five by the speaker of the Assembly. [s. 13.81 (1), Stats.]

The Joint Legislative Council establishes study committees during the recess periods of the Legislature. The council determines which studies will be conducted and establishes committees to review, study, and propose recommendations. These studies generally are of four types:

- Intensive examination of problems that are expected to confront a succeeding Legislature.
- Review of controversial subjects that were unresolved by the previous Legislature.

- Major codifications and revisions of portions of the law.
- Methods of improving the operation and effectiveness of state agencies.

There are two continuing council committees currently required by statute: the Special Committee on State-Tribal Relations; and the Law Revision Committee. [s. 13.83, Stats.]

Each committee submits a report to the Joint Legislative Council. In almost all cases, the report makes recommendations for legislative changes based upon its study. The council reviews the recommendations for legislation and introduces those approved by a majority of the membership of the council (12 votes).

Operation of Legislative Council Staff

The Joint Legislative Council and the council's study committees are staffed by a nonpartisan legislative service agency. The Legislative Council staff serves in the unclassified service. As of May 31, 2022, the council staff included, in addition to the Director, 17 attorneys, two analysts, and four administrative staff.

The basic duties of the staff include:

Services for the council and its committees. The Legislative Council staff provides services for the Joint Legislative Council and its study committees.

Services for legislative committees. The Legislative Council staff provides nonpartisan legal analysis and policy research for standing committees and their subcommittees, select or special committees of the Legislature, and a number of joint statutory committees. The Legislative Council staff serves as the secretariat for the Joint Committee on Legislative Organization and for the Joint Committee on Employment Relations.

Services for individual legislators. Upon request, the Legislative Council staff provides legal analysis and other research to individual legislators.

Administrative Rules Clearinghouse. Prior to any public hearing on a proposed rule, or prior to notification of the chief clerks if no hearing is required, the agency proposing the rule must submit the proposed rule to the Legislative Council staff for review. The Legislative Council staff is required to review the rule for various technical requirements, such as statutory authority for promulgation of the rule and the form and clarity of the rule and issue a clearinghouse report with its comments on the rule. The Legislative Council staff also works with and assists the appropriate standing committees throughout the rule-making process. COMMERCIAL BUILDING PERMITTING PROCESS

The Joint Legislative Council established the Study Committee on the Commercial Building Permitting Process and appointed the chairperson by an April 8, 2022 mail ballot. The committee's assignment was the following:

...to review the current commercial building permitting process. This review shall focus on the commercial plan review process within the Department of Safety and Professional Services and municipalities, timelines for environmental permitting, and the role of the Commercial Building Code Council. As part of its review, the study committee shall also evaluate approaches in other states and identify innovative and exemplary policies that could serve as a model for Wisconsin. Following this review, the committee shall recommend legislation to improve the commercial building permitting process.

Membership of the study committee was appointed by a May 31, 2022 mail ballot. Final committee membership consisted of one senator, three representatives, and nine public members. A list of the committee membership can be found in the **appendix** to this report.

The study committee held four meetings on the following dates:

Summary of Committee Activity

The Joint Legislative Council established the Study Committee on Increasing Offender Employment Opportunities and appointed the chairperson by an April 8, 2022 mail ballot. The committee's assignment was the following:

...to review existing impediments to employment and job training for individuals who are incarcerated or recently released and to recommend legislation following its review. The committee shall explore ways to expand connections between private employers and potential employees who are incarcerated in state institutions or on extended supervision, explore vocational earned release programs for possible implementation, consider release location flexibility based on employment opportunities, and evaluate other methods for improving job prospects for the offender population.

Membership of the study committee was appointed by a May 31, 2022 mail ballot. Final committee membership consisted of two senators, four representatives, and five public members. A list of the committee membership can be found in the **appendix** to this report.

The study committee held five meetings on the following dates:

LAW REVISION COMMITTEE

Summary of Committee Activity

The Law Revision Committee was first created by the Legislative Council at its May 30, 1980 meeting, as a statutory committee of the Council, pursuant to s. 13.83 (1), Stats., as created by Ch. 204, Laws of 1979. The membership of the committee is to be appointed in "each biennium." Members were most recently appointed on September 6, 2023. The membership of the committee consisted of four senators and four representatives. A list of the committee membership can be found in the **appendix** to this report.

The statute directs the committee to:

- Review remedial legislation based on non-substantive changes recommended by agencies;
- Review court decisions and opinions of the attorney general which state that a statute is unconstitutional, ambiguous, or otherwise in need of revision; and
- Review correction bills and minor substantive revision bills prepared by the Legislative Reference Bureau.

The committee is also directed to introduce the bills prepared on these subjects directly, not through the Council, into the Legislature.

The committee's activity for the period covered by this report is summarized below.

During the period covered by this report, the committee held one meeting on February 14, 2024.

Summary of Committee Activity

The Joint Legislative Council established the Study Committee on Occupational Licenses and appointed the chairperson by an April 8, 2022 mail ballot. The committee's assignment was the following:

...to review the current occupational licensing system administered by the Department of Safety and Professional Services. The committee shall review prior recommendations made by the department regarding any current laws requiring occupational credentials that may be eliminated without clearly harming or endangering the health, safety, or welfare of the public. The committee shall also review whether it is necessary to implement systems of review both to determine the necessity of legislative proposals for new occupational credentials, and to periodically review the appropriateness of maintaining current occupational credential requirements. Lastly, the committee shall review options to expand access to individuals from other states to receive a reciprocal credential to

practice in Wisconsin. Following these reviews, the committee shall recommend legislation on current credentials that may be eliminated, on systems for review of new and existing occupational credentials, and on the issuance of reciprocal credentials.

Membership of the study committee was appointed by a May 31, 2022 mail ballot. Final committee membership consisted of two senators, two representatives, and five public members. A list of the committee membership can be found in the **appendix** to this report.

SHARED SCHOOL DISTRICT SERVICES

The Joint Legislative Council established the Study Committee on Shared School District Services and appointed the chairperson by an April 8, 2022 mail ballot. The committee's assignment was the following:

...to review current barriers to shared administrative or other services between school districts, and explore statutory changes or creation of incentives to encourage efficiencies. The committee shall consider methods for sharing or consolidating services such as district-level administration and personnel, purchasing, technology and data processing, transportation, food service, and building maintenance and make recommendations for legislation. As part of its work, the committee shall study school district structures employed in other states, particularly county-wide school district models.

Membership of the study committee was appointed by a May 31, 2022 mail ballot. Final committee membership consisted of two senators, two representatives, and six public members. A list of the committee membership can be found in the **appendix** to this report.

The study committee held five meetings on the following dates:

July 20, 2022 August 22, 2022 October 26, 2022 November 30, 2022 December 13, 2022

UNIFORM DEATH REPORTING STANDARDS

The Joint Legislative Council established the Study Committee on Uniform Death Reporting Standards and appointed the chairperson by an April 8, 2022 mail ballot. The committee's assignment was the following:

...to review the current protocols for investigating causes of death and reporting death, and the uniformity of those protocols. The review shall focus on options to implement more comprehensive uniform death reporting standards across Wisconsin, including the advantages and barriers to implementation of such standards. Following review, the committee shall develop legislation to provide minimum requirements for death investigations and reporting, particularly deaths involving homicide, suicide, child or infant death, domestic violence, maternal mortality, and substance use.

Membership of the study committee was appointed by a May 31, 2022 mail ballot. Final committee membership consisted of two senators, two representatives, and seven public members. A list of the committee membership can be found in the **appendix** to this report.

The study committee held five meetings on the following dates:

July 18, 2022 August 17, 2022 October 17, 2022 November 15, 2022 December 15, 2022.

WISCONSIN NATIONAL GUARD SEXUAL MISCONDUCT PROCEDURES

The Joint Legislative Council established the Study Committee on Wisconsin National Guard Sexual Misconduct Procedures and appointed the chairperson by an April 8, 2022 mail ballot. The committee's assignment was the following:

...to study the Wisconsin National Guard's procedures for investigating and addressing sexual misconduct. The committee shall review the findings and recommendations contained in previously completed investigations into the Wisconsin National Guard's procedures, with a particular focus on the National Guard Bureau Office of Complex Investigation's assessment of the Wisconsin National Guard's sexual assault and harassment reporting procedures, investigation protocols, and accountability measures. The committee is directed to recommend legislation that enhances oversight of the Wisconsin National Guard as it relates to sexual misconduct, ensures state law complies with relevant federal requirements, and amends the Wisconsin Code of Military Justice where necessary.

Membership of the study committee was appointed by a May 31, 2022 mail ballot. Final committee membership consisted of two senators, two representatives, and seven public members. A list of the committee membership can be found in the **appendix** to this report.

Actions of the Joint Legislative Council

At its March 23, 2023 meeting, the Joint Legislative Council voted to introduce the following legislation:

- 2023 Assembly Bill 177 (2023 Senate Bill 166), relating to punitive articles in the Wisconsin Code of Military Justice prohibiting certain activities with a military recruit or trainee by a person in a position of special trust, prohibiting certain retaliatory activities, prohibiting sexual harassment, and prohibiting sexual assault; pretrial, trial, and post-trial procedures applicable to courts-martial cases under the Wisconsin Code of Military Justice; treatment of victims of an offense under the Wisconsin Military Code of Justice; defining military offenses under the Wisconsin Code of Military Justice; punishments for violations of the Wisconsin Code of Military Justice; and the removal of gender-specific language from the Wisconsin Code of Military Justice.
- 2023 Assembly Bill 178 (2023 Senate Bill 167), relating to annual reporting to the legislature of sexual harassment and assault that occurs in the Wisconsin National Guard and of changes to the Uniform Code of Military Justice.
- 2023 Assembly Bill 179 (2023 Senate Bill 168), relating to a case management system for tracking misconduct within the Wisconsin National Guard.

2023 Senate Bill 166 became 2023 Wisconsin Act 47, 2023 Senate Bill 167 became 2023 Wisconsin Act 48, and 2023 Senate Bill 168 became 2023 Wisconsin Act 49 during the 2023-24 legislative session. Summary of Committee Activity

The Special Committee on State-Tribal Relations is a permanent committee of the Joint Legislative Council established under s. 13.83 (3), Stats. The committee is directed by statute to study issues related to American Indians and the American Indian tribes and bands in this state and develop specific recommendations and legislative proposals relating to these issues.

The membership of the committee, appointed by the Joint Legislative Council, consists of not fewer than six nor more than 12 legislator members of the Senate and Assembly, including at least one member of the majority party and at least one member of the minority party from each house, and not fewer than six nor more than 11 members selected from names submitted by the federally recognized American Indian tribes and bands in this state (tribes) or the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council (GLITC), including not more than one member based on the recommendation of any tribe or GLITC. The committee is assisted by a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) composed of a representative of each of the following state departments: Children and Families; Health Services; Justice; Natural Resources; Public Instruction; Revenue; Transportation; and Workforce Development. A list of the committee membership and the TAC membership can be found in the **appendix** to this report.

- 2023 Assembly Bill 210 (2023 Senate Bill 199), relating to pupils wearing traditional tribal regalia at a graduation ceremony or school-sponsored event.
- 2023 Assembly Bill 211 (2023 Senate Bill 200), relating to authorization for tribal governments to copy certified copies of vital records for administrative use.
- 2023 Assembly Bill 212 (2023 Senate Bill 201), relating to requiring school districts to report information related to American Indian children attending school in the school district.

- 2023 Assembly Bill 213 (2023 Senate Bill 202), relating to o Indigenous Peoples' Day.
- 2023 Assembly Bill 214 (2023 Senate Bill 203), relating to a lifetime license that authorizes an individual to teach an American Indian language in an American Indian language program and modifying rules promulgated by the Department of Public Instruction.
- 2023 Assembly Bill 215 (2023 Senate Bill 204), relating to the membership of the Higher Educational Aids Board.

Actions of the Legislature

The recommendations of the committee failed to be enacted during the 2023-24 legislative session.
