Special Committee on Highway Weight Limits

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PART I

KEY PROVISIONS OF COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Joint Legislative Council recommends the following for introduction in the 2007-08 Session of the Legislature.

2007 Assembly Bill 238, Relating to Requiring the Department of Transportation to Study Vehicle Size and Weight Limits

Assembly Bill 238 does the following:

- Requires the Department of Transportation (DOT) to contract for a study of Wisconsin
 truck size and weight limit laws, to identify changes in those laws that would have a net
 benefit to Wisconsin's economy, when considering the costs of protecting highway
 infrastructure and safety, and the benefits that would result from reducing the cost of truck
 transportation.
- Requires the consultant that undertakes the study to review those vehicle configurations, changes in seasonal restrictions, and other policy issues that were found to have a net benefit in the cost-benefit analysis in a Minnesota truck size and weight project final report that was issued in June 2006. The consultant must prepare a report on the results of the study and submit the report to the Legislature no later than January 1, 2009.
- Requires DOT to appoint an advisory committee to assist in the review and the report.

PART II COMMITTEE ACTIVITY

Assignment

The Joint Legislative Council established the Special Committee on Highway Weight Limits and appointed the chairperson by a June 9, 2006 mail ballot. 2005 Wisconsin Act 167 mandated this study. The Special Committee was directed to review the system of motor vehicle weight limits on the state's highways and bridges. The Special Committee was directed to include in its study the issues and interrelationships between economic impacts, truck configurations, expected compliance levels and enforcement constraints, and impacts on the public infrastructure, operational, and safety issues.

Membership of the Special Committee, appointed by an August 1, 2006 mail ballot, consisted of two Senators, three Representatives, and 11 public members. A list of committee members is included as *Appendix 4* to this report.

Summary of Meetings

The Special Committee held three meetings in Madison on the following dates:

September 22, 2006 November 13, 2006 January 8, 2007

At the <u>September 22, 2006 meeting</u>, the Special Committee heard a comprehensive presentation on the current statutes and administrative rules regarding highway weight limits, presented by several members of the staff of DOT. The DOT staff discussed the maximum allowable weight limits, the types of permits for overweight loads, the requirements for obtaining an overweight permit and the relationship of federal, state, and local weight limits. The Special Committee then received public testimony from representatives of a number of organizations with an interest in highway weight limits.

At the <u>November 13, 2006 meeting</u>, the Special Committee heard testimony from Captain Charles Teasdale and David Veith of DOT on the number of citations issued for overweight trucks, the discretion of officers in deciding whether to issue citations, and the potential for issuing citations based on private scales. The Special Committee also received public testimony from the Wisconsin Troopers' Association, the Wisconsin Counties Association, and a representative of the Taylor County highway department, who all emphasized the need for effective enforcement of current weight limits. The Special Committee discussed a recent Minnesota study of the costs and benefits of highway weight limits. Chairperson Gottlieb suggested that the Special Committee consider recommending further DOT review of the cost-benefit analysis of weight limits in the Minnesota study to determine if any of the conclusions in that study are applicable in Wisconsin.

At the <u>January 8, 2007 meeting</u>, the Special Committee reviewed and adopted, with minor modifications, a proposed letter from Chairperson Gottlieb to the 2007 Co-Chairpersons of the Joint Committee on Finance (JCF) requesting additional funding and position authorizations for enforcement of truck weight limit laws in the state. Subsequently, on January 12, 2007, that letter, signed by Chairperson Gottlieb and indicating adoption of the letter by the Special Committee, was sent to Senator Russ Decker and Representative Kitty Rhoades, Co-Chairpersons of the JCF.

The Special Committee also reviewed and approved on January 8th, with modifications, WLC: 0033/1, a bill draft relating to requiring the Wisconsin DOT to study Wisconsin truck size and weight limits.

Finally, the Special Committee discussed sending a letter to the members of the Wisconsin Congressional Delegation requesting their support for federal legislation allowing for an exemption to the weight limit for hauling raw forest products on Interstate Highway 39, such that trucks with six axles and a 98,000 pound load would be permitted to use that highway. Chairperson Gottlieb suggested that a general letter to that effect be signed by legislative members of the Special Committee and be sent to the delegation. Senator Jauch indicated that he would be offering, in this legislative session, his own Senate resolution requesting such an exemption.

PART III

RECOMMENDATION INTRODUCED BY THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

This part of the report provides background information on, and a description of, 2007 Assembly Bill 238.

Background

Early in its work, the Special Committee was informed of the recent completion of a study of truck size and weight limits in Minnesota. The final report of this study was published in June 2006 in a report entitled *Minnesota Truck Size and Weight Project*. The report was prepared by consultants for the Minnesota Department of Transportation, although the department provided leadership for the study. The study was comprehensive and included participation by, and input from, a substantial number of public and private stakeholders. In the study, Minnesota assessed changes to the truck size and weight limit laws that would strike a balance between: (1) benefits to the Minnesota economy resulting from appropriate size and weight limits; and (2) continuing public safety and protection of state roads and bridges.

The Special Committee noted many similarities between issues considered in the Minnesota study and issues that were suggested to the Special Committee for consideration and determined that there would be substantial value in conducting a similar study in Wisconsin. The Minnesota study identified a number of truck axle and weight configurations, changes in the seasonal weight limits, and other policy modifications that would have a positive cost-benefit ratio when comparing costs of protecting the highway infrastructure and ensuring public safety to the benefits to the state's economy of reducing the costs of trucking by allowing heavier loads. The Special Committee determined that: (1) if similar findings were made in a Wisconsin study, statutory and policy changes could be based on those findings and would result in a net benefit to the Wisconsin economy while taking into consideration the effects on the infrastructure and safety of state and local highways, roads, and bridges; and (2) the broad scope of such a study would require significant expertise, time, and resources, and would be beyond the capabilities of the committee.

Description

The bill does the following:

- 1. Requires DOT to contract for a study of Wisconsin truck size and weight limit laws, to identify changes in those laws that would have a net benefit to Wisconsin's economy, when considering the costs of protecting highway infrastructure and safety, and the benefits that would result from reducing the cost of truck transportation.
- 2. Requires the consultant that undertakes the study to review those vehicle configurations, changes in seasonal restrictions, and other policy issues that were found to have a net benefit in the cost-benefit analysis in the Minnesota truck size and weight project final report that was issued in June 2006.
- 3. Requires DOT to appoint an advisory committee to assist in the required review and the report under item 4., below. The advisory committee must include representation from the Department of Commerce; local governmental units; trucking companies; industries and small businesses that depend on truck transport; enforcement agencies; and other groups and individuals that are interested in and knowledgeable about truck size and weight limits. The DOT must allow all advisory committee

members to present written commentary on or dissenting views from the report and must incorporate that commentary and any dissents into the final report.

4. Requires the consultant that undertakes the study to prepare a report on the results of its study. The DOT must submit the report to the Legislature no later than January 1, 2009.

PART IV OTHER ACTION OF THE COMMITTEE

At its January 8, 2007 meeting, the Special Committee adopted a letter from its Chairperson, Representative Gottlieb, to the Co-Chairpersons of the JCF (Senator Russ Decker and Representative Kitty Rhoades), requesting additional funding and position authorizations for enforcement of truck weight limit laws in the state. Subsequently, on January 12, 2007, that letter, signed by Chairperson Gottlieb and indicating adoption of the letter by the Special Committee, was sent to the Co-Chairpersons of the JCF. A copy of the letter is attached as *Appendix 2* to this report.

The letter was adopted by a vote of Ayes, 12 (Reps. Gottlieb and Friske; Sen. Jauch; and Public Members Cook, Geurts, Hollett, Howells, Johnson, Ottery, Schienebeck, Teasdale, and Vandehey); Noes, 1 (Public Member McQuestion); and Absent, 0.

Committee and Joint Legislative Council Votes

WLC: 0033/2 was recommended by the Special Committee on Highway Weight Limits to the Joint Legislative Council for introduction in the 2007-08 Session of the Legislature.

Special Committee Vote

The Special Committee voted to recommend WLC: 0033/2 (which subsequently became LRB-1866/1) to the Joint Legislative Council for introduction in the 2007-08 Session of the Legislature. The vote on the draft was as follows:

• WLC: 0033/2, relating to requiring the DOT to study Wisconsin truck size and weight limits: Ayes, 13 (Reps. Gottlieb and Friske; Sen. Jauch; and Public Members Cook, Geurts, Hollett, Howells, Johnson, McQuestion, Ottery, Schienebeck, Teasdale, and Vandehey); Noes, 0; and Absent, 3 (Rep. Petrowski; Sen. Decker; and Public Member Scola).

Joint Legislative Council Vote

At its March 14, 2007 meeting, the Joint Legislative Council voted as follows on the recommendation of the Special Committee:

• Sen. Harsdorf moved, seconded by Rep. Schneider, that LRB-1866/1, relating to requiring the DOT to study vehicle size and weight limits, be introduced by the Joint Legislative Council. The motion passed on a roll call vote as follows: Ayes, 18 (Reps. Wieckert, Ballweg, Berceau, Fitzgerald, Gottlieb, Pocan, Rhoades, and Schneider; and Sens. Risser, Carpenter, Coggs, Darling, Decker, Fitzgerald, Harsdorf, Lasee, Miller, and Robson); Noes, 0; and Absent, 4 (Reps. Huebsch, Kaufert, and Kreuser; and Sen. Breske).

The proposal that the Joint Legislative Council voted to introduce was subsequently introduced as 2007 Assembly Bill 238.

Dear Co-Chairpersons Decker and Rhoades:

This letter is a request for additional funding and position authorizations for enforcement of truck weight limit laws in the state. Members of the Joint Legislative Council's Special Committee on Highway Weight Limits have determined, based on extensive testimony and committee discussion, that enforcement of current highway weight limit laws is a critical issue for protection of the public investment in roads and bridges.

The enforcement of truck weight limits is a difficult and time-consuming process for an individual state patrol inspector. Currently, much of the weight limit enforcement effort is focused on interstate highways, yet it is clear from testimony received by the committee that, due in significant part to lack of enforcement, a substantial amount of serious damage is being done to the smaller state trunk highways, local highways, and bridges. Especially in the northern part of the state, there are only one or two state patrol inspectors providing enforcement in multicounty areas.

In order to have a credible enforcement presence and to use the threat of enforcement as an effective way of encouraging voluntary compliance with weight limit laws, the Special Committee believes that the state must hire additional Wisconsin state patrol inspectors. The Special Committee discussed the possibility of the use of additional local enforcement officers for enforcement. However, testimony on this issue was discouraging, because local officers who are trained in truck weight limit enforcement are, during their work shifts, often called upon to perform other assignments and are not available to engage in truck weight limit enforcement on a consistent basis.

However, it is clear to Special Committee members that the investment of transportation fund money in state highways, roads, and bridges must be protected, and that one of the most effective ways of doing this is by vigorous weight limit enforcement by a sufficient number of state patrol inspectors.

This letter was adopted by the members of the Joint Legislative Council's Special Committee on Highway Weight Limits by a vote of Ayes, 12 (Reps. Gottlieb and Friske; Sen. Jauch; and Public Members Cook, Geurts, Hollett, Howells, Johnson, Ottery, Schienebeck, Teasdale, and Vandehey; Noes, 1 (Public Member McQuestion).
