Community-based Primary Care Residency Expansion Grants

- Example: 9-28-10 Marshfield Clinic-St Joseph's Hospital Internal Medicine and Pediatric Residency Programs were awarded HRSA Primary Care Expansion grants totaling \$3.8M to be dispersed over five years to expand primary care training and workforce in community based settings.
- The grant creates four new residency positions:
 - Two additional Internal Medicine Slots per year
 - Two additional Pediatric Slots per year
 - 50% Increase







Recruitment: Marshfield Clinic

- · 20 openings in Family Medicine system wide
 - -2 have been open since 2004
 - 11 open since 2006
 - 3 open since 2007
 - -2 open since 2008
 - -2 open since 2009
- Average time to fill, all specialties
 - -6 to 9 months, "urban" clinic locations
 - Significantly longer in rural locations









Vision for the Future

- · Team-based integrated care
- Physician training shifts to data assessment and management, population health, dashboards, electronic decision support, quality improvement and team management
- Growth of PA, NP, and MA workforce and scope with greater interaction with physicians in training
- · Quality-based education grows substantially
- Telemedicine training models
- · Simulation education requirements
- Comparative effectiveness research and guidelines beyond chronic disease management

Partnership with Family Health Center of Marshfield, Inc

- The Family Health Center of Marshfield Inc is a Federally Qualified Community Health Center. Community health centers are designed to provide health care services in medically underserved areas.
- Family Health Center has 25 locations [7 of which are dental] within the Marshfield Clinic system of care.
- Marshfield Clinic providers partner with the Family Health Center to provide care to its targeted populations.
- Under the Prevention and Public Health Fund of the Affordable Care Act community health centers will increase their role as academic training centers.

Medical Simulation

 In 2009, the Division of Education conducted 375 courses for over 2000 participants using the Marshfield Clinic Simulation Lab





Dental Residency Expansion

- According to the March 31, 2010 WI Department of Health Services Oral Health Education Study an increase of 45 dental residency slots is needed in the State [distributed between Marshfield Clinic and Marquette]
- Marquesse;
 Presently Section 447 of the State Licensure Statue is a barrier to such an increase. In order to increase dental residencies, Marshfield clinic encourages language revisions that allow residents from accredited hospital programs regardless of their US location and community realth programs be exempt from licensure, similar to that offered to Wisconsin hospitals.
