1 **AN ACT** *to create* 49.45 (24g) (f) of the statutes; **relating to:** expanding the physician

2 practice payment pilot program.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

JOINT LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL PREFATORY NOTE: This draft was prepared for the Joint Legislative Council's Special Committee on Infant Mortality.

2009 Wisconsin Act 28, the biennial budget, required the Department of Health Services (DHS) to develop a proposal to establish a Medicaid (MA) physician practice payment pilot program. Under the program, DHS increased MA reimbursement to providers that are recognized by the National Committee on Quality Assurance as a patient–centered medical home; or were determined to perform well with respect to aspects of care that are specified in the act. DHS is required to pay monthly per–patient coordination fees to participating providers. DHS may not implement the increases in reimbursement rates, or pay monthly per–patient care coordination fees before July, 2011. The "physician practice payment pilot program" was implemented as the "medical home pilot", described below.

In the fall of 2009, DHS issued a request for proposals for the BadgerCare Plus HMO contract for Southeast Wisconsin. Separate contracts were awarded to 4 HMOs to provide services in the 6 Southeast counties. The contracts required: (1) a medical home pilot for high–risk pregnant women; (2) a poor birth outcome assessment; (3) a Memorandum of Understanding with prenatal care coordination providers in their service area; and (4) coordination with community–based agencies.

The contract provisions regarding the medical home pilot for high–risk pregnant women specify that member criteria are women who are pregnant, on the high–risk registry complied by DHS, identified by a health care provider as being eligible for the high–risk registry, or under age 18 who live in high–risk areas of Milwaukee, Racine, or Kenosha or who have a chronic health condition. The contract provisions regarding the medical home pilot also include specific provisions designed to improve birth outcomes, including a \$1,000 incentive payment for every birth to an eligible member in the pilot and an additional \$1,000 for a

positive birth outcome. The HMO contracts became effective in September 2010 and are in effect for a 3–year term. The medical home pilots will be implemented in January 2011.

This draft requires DHS to expand the program for high–risk pregnant women created under the physician practice pilot program to Rock and Dane Counties as soon as practicable.
