Special Committee on Review of Spousal Maintenance Awards in Divorce Proceedings

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PART I

KEY PROVISIONS OF COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Special Committee on Review of Spousal Maintenance Awards in Divorce Proceedings recommends the following bill to the Joint Legislative Council for introduction in the 2011-12 Session of the Legislature.

2011 Assembly Bill 134, Relating to Termination of Maintenance Upon the Payee's or Payer's Death and Notices Relating to Maintenance

2011 Assembly Bill 134:

- Provides that, unless already terminated for another reason, maintenance (formerly known as "alimony") terminates upon the death of the payee (recipient of the maintenance) or the payer.
- Provides that when a court orders maintenance or family support (a combination of child support and maintenance) in a divorce, annulment, or legal separation, the court must include in the order a requirement that the payee notify the court and the payer if the payee remarries.
- Requires the court to vacate a maintenance order upon notice from the payee that he or she has remarried, in addition to vacating the order upon the application of the payer and proof of the payee's remarriage (current law).

PART II COMMITTEE ACTIVITY

Assignment

The Joint Legislative Council established the Special Committee on Review of Spousal Maintenance Awards in Divorce Proceedings and appointed the chairperson by a May 7, 2010 mail ballot. The committee was directed to study: (a) the purpose and goals of awarding maintenance; (b) making application of the maintenance considerations given in s. 767.56, Stats., more uniform and predictable; (c) whether the statutes should provide guidance to the courts relating to amount and duration of a maintenance award; (d) whether cohabitation should be considered when revising maintenance orders under s. 767.59, Stats.; and (e) whether marital fault should be considered when determining a maintenance award.

Membership of the Special Committee was appointed by June 30, 2010 and October 20, 2010, and January 6, 2011 mail ballots. The final committee membership consisted of one Senator, three Representatives and 13 public members. A list of committee members is included as *Appendix 3* to this report.

Summary of Meetings

The Special Committee held three meetings on the following dates:

August 24, 2010 October 14, 2010 December 8, 2010

At the <u>August 24 meeting</u>, the Special Committee heard invited testimony from committee member and retired Waukesha County Circuit Judge, Robert Mawdsley, regarding the process used to teach maintenance issues to judges at the Wisconsin Judicial College, including the use of a computer program developed by Judge Mac Davis of Waukesha County and the use of maintenance fact scenarios with groups of judges. After the staff described the current maintenance law in Wisconsin and provided an overview of pertinent maintenance laws in other states, committee members spent the remainder of the meeting discussing ideas and concepts to be explored at the next meeting of the committee, including the lack of consistency in maintenance decision-making amongst judges in various areas of the state, the need to retain judicial discretion as part of any committee recommendations for changes in current maintenance law, and the need for guidelines and clarity in the maintenance law, especially with reference to pro se litigants.

At the <u>October 14, 2010 meeting</u>, Judge Mawdsley demonstrated to the Special Committee the specific process through which spousal maintenance is taught at the Judicial College, using the Judge Davis formula and a specific fact situation. After the staff reviewed its Memos relating to modification of maintenance awards, the background of no-fault divorce in Wisconsin, and studies on the use of maintenance in divorce cases, including pro se cases, the committee reviewed Memo No. 3 from the staff, *Suggested Options, to Date, for Revising Wisconsin's Spousal Maintenance Laws* (October 7, 2010). The committee had an extensive discussion of the various alternatives on the key issues presented in the Memo, including guidelines based on other states' laws or on uniform laws as to the circumstances in which maintenance should be awarded; the possible elimination or restriction of indefinite maintenance; the amount and duration of maintenance payments in general; the use of cohabitation as a factor in the initial maintenance award or in modifying a maintenance award; the notices required where the maintenance recipient remarries and the significance of the income of a payer's new spouse in a modification of maintenance determination; and the effect of an inheritance by

the recipient or the death of a payer on maintenance payments. The committee directed the staff to prepare various bill draft proposals in accordance with their suggestions.

At the <u>December 8, 2010 meeting</u>, the Special Committee discussed and decided whether bill drafts prepared by the staff should be submitted to the committee for a mail ballot. After a full discussion, the committee determined that the following bill drafts, as redrafted or subdivided as appropriate by the staff into final form, should be submitted to committee members for their vote by mail ballot: WLC: 0031/1, relating to termination of maintenance upon the payee's or payer's death and notices relating to maintenance; WLC: 0039/1, relating to termination of maintenance upon cohabitation of the payee; WLC: 0007/1, relating to when a maintenance award may be granted and the duration of such an award; WLC: 0015/1, relating to amount and duration of maintenance records; WLC: 0006/1, relating to amount and duration of maintenance awards; WLC: 0040/1, relating to grant a maintenance award; and WLC: 0041/1, relating to prohibiting consideration of income of payer's subsequent spouse, and permitting consideration of an inheritance received by a payee, for maintenance revision purposes.

PART III

RECOMMENDATION INTRODUCED BY THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

This part of the report provides background information on, and a description of, the bill as recommended by the Special Committee on Review of Spousal Maintenance Awards in Divorce Proceedings.

2011 Assembly Bill 134, Relating to Termination of Maintenance Upon the Payee's or Payer's Death and Notices Relating to Maintenance

Background

Under current law, in an action for divorce, annulment, or legal separation, a court may order one party (payer) to pay maintenance (formerly known as alimony) to the other party (payee) for a limited or indefinite length of time.

Current law does not specify the effect of either party's death on the maintenance order.

Current law provides that, if a payee of maintenance remarries, the court must vacate the maintenance order upon the application by the payer and proof of the payee's remarriage.

Description

Termination Upon Payer's or Payee's Death

The bill provides that, unless already terminated for another reason, such as the payee's remarriage or the expiration of a limited time under an order, maintenance terminates upon the death of the payee or the payer, whichever occurs first. Under the Internal Revenue Code, maintenance must end at the payee's death in order for the payer to be able to deduct the payments from his or her gross income for income tax purposes.

Notices Relating to Maintenance

The bill provides that, when a court orders maintenance or family support (a combination of child support and maintenance), the court must include in the order a requirement that the payee notify the court and the payer if the payee remarries.

The bill requires a court to vacate a maintenance order upon notice from the payee that he or she has remarried, or upon the application of the payer and proof of the payee's remarriage.

Committee and Joint Legislative Council Votes

The following bill draft is recommended by the Special Committee on Review of Spousal Maintenance Awards in Divorce Proceedings to the Joint Legislative Council for introduction in the 2011-12 Session of the Legislature.

Special Committee Vote

The Special Committee voted, by a January 24, 2011 mail ballot, to recommend the following draft to the Joint Legislative Council for introduction in the 2011-12 Session of the Legislature. The votes on the bill draft are as follows:

• WLC: 0031/1, relating to termination of maintenance upon the payee's or payer's death and notices relating to maintenance, passed by a vote of Ayes, 14 (Reps. Staskunas, Vruwink, and Kleefisch; Sen. Olsen; Public Members Bruch, Budny, Hatfield, Mansfield, Matznick, Mawdsley, Pence, Pocan, Potter, and Seubert); Noes, 1 (Public Member Lundin); and Not Voting, 2 (Public Members Grogan and Plale). [WLC: 0031/1 subsequently became LRB-1401/1.]

Joint Legislative Council Vote

• Rep. Kaufert moved, seconded by Sen. Schultz, that **LRB-1401/1**, relating to termination of maintenance upon the payee's or payer's death and notices relating to maintenance, be introduced by the Joint Legislative Council. The motion passed on a roll call vote of Ayes, 13 (Reps. Ballweg, Barca, Fitzgerald, Grigsby, Kaufert, Nygren and Suder; and Sens. Lazich, Cullen, Erpenbach, Miller, Schultz and Taylor); Noes, 2 (Rep. Berceau and Sen. Lasee); and Absent, 7 (Reps. Kramer, Pasch and Vos; and Sens. Darling, Fitzgerald, Galloway and Leibham).

[Sens. Fitzgerald and Galloway noted that had they been present, they would have voted "aye."]
