



How It Works

First two CNC courses transcribed (4 credits)

10 high schools per semester at 12 students each

Visit each high school for 3.5 hours (4 periods) each week (am or pm)

NWTC Lab Aide delivers, sets-up and assists the high school instructor

High school instructors are trained at NWTC

\$5000 operating fee/semester for each high school – sponsorship opportunities




BUT...



Post-secondary tuition paid by school districts, rather than parents, through Youth Options

NWTC college courses taught by high school teachers following the NWTC curriculum (Wausaukee-Pembine)

Mathematics – College Math, Math for Business, Trades Math

English – <u>English Composition</u>, Oral/Interpersonal Communications

Science – Anatomy/Structure/Function, Medical Terminology



The Second Chance Partners for Education Program is a one-of-a-kind alternative education model which provides non-traditional learners the opportunity to earn their high school diploma in an industrial setting.

It combines a sound academic foundation with hands-on industry experiences.

Second Chance Program

Disengaged and credit-deficient students identified by high schools

Students selected by Second Chance Partners

Curriculum approved by the school districts and aligned

with academic and industry standards

Full time state certified teachers

Education Centers located inside participating businesses

Program runs for 21 consecutive months

Students graduate with their home high school class

Credits earned are articulated with WTCS



Green Bay Second Chance Program

17 students enrolled for Fall 2012, hosted at Lindquist Machine Corporation Classes two hours daily in the company conference room Work until 3:30 at area businesses, earning as they learn
