Definitions/Acronyms

NCHS	National Center of Health Statistics
VSCP	Vital Statistics Cooperative Program
NAPHSIS	National Association for Public Health Statistics and Information Systems
SVRO	State Vital Records Office
SVRIS	Statewide Vital Records Information System
C/ME	Coroner/Medical Examiner
Medical Certifier	Physician, coroner, or medical examiner that completes the cause of death statement on a death record
COD/MOD	Cause of Death / Manner of Death

Vital Records 101

- What is a vital record?
 - Birth, death, marriage, divorce, declaration of domestic partnership, termination of domestic partnership
 - Worksheets approved by State Registrar that are related to these records
 - Data related to these records or worksheets
- Vital records typically contain statistical, demographic, and medical data

Vital Records 101 (cont.)

- Vital Records are a state function and are not federally mandated
- 57 jurisdictions
 - 50 states, U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Puerto Rico, Guam, District of Columbia, New York City, and Northern Marianas Islands
- NAPHSIS provides model law to promote uniformity in vital records across jurisdictions

Vital Records 101 (cont.)

- Governed primarily by Wis. Stat. Chapter 69
 - Other statutes and Admin codes also affect vital records
 - Wis. Stat. Chapter 765, Chapter 979, DHS 142 and DHS 135
- In Wisconsin, vital records were not required to be registered with the state until October 1907
- It is estimated that state records do not exist for more than 50% of the births, deaths, and marriages that occurred prior to that time



Vital Records 101 (cont.)

- National Center of Health Statistics
 - Division of Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)
 - Formed in 1960 with the merging of the National Office of Vital Statistics and the National Health Survey
 - Provides detailed specifications for collecting and reporting the items on birth, death, and fetal death certificates along with training on improving cause of death statements
 - ♦ NVSS Writing Cause-of-Death Statements (cdc.gov)
 - Provides ICD-10 medical coding of cause of death statements back to jurisdictions

Core Functions

- SVRO is responsible for filing, preserving, protecting, amending, and issuing certified and uncertified copies of vital records for events that occur in Wisconsin
- Administer and enforce Wis. Stat. Chapter 69
- Direct the system of vital records
 - Including providing direction to the local registrars
- Act as record custodian for all records in the office of vital records

Core Functions (cont.)

- Prescribe, furnish, and distribute forms related to vital records
- Prepare and publish an annual report of vital statistics
 - Vital Statistics | Wisconsin Department of Health Services
 - WISH (Wisconsin Interactive Statistics on Health) Query
 System | Wisconsin Department of Health Services
- Provide local health departments with vital statistics for planning and program activities

Deeper Dive into Death Records

- Wis. Stat. 69.18 controls
 - Who may move a corpse for final disposition
 - When a death record is to be filed with SVRO and who is responsible for filing the record
 - Who may act as the medical certifier
 - And more...
- While SVRO provides direction on the manner in which records are filed, oversight concerning the determination of cause and manner of death is limited

- Flow of a death record in SVRIS
 - Funeral director (or coroner/medical examiner) initiates death record in SVRIS by entering decedent's personal information
 - Funeral director reviews information with family
 - Funeral director makes any necessary changes to the death record
 - Funeral director selects the medical certifier and saves the record
 - Death record is routed to the medical certifier

- Flow of a death record in SVRIS (cont.)
 - Medical certifier reviews the death record; enters cause-of-death information; and electronically signs and certifies the death record
 - Death record is routed to the funeral director.
 - Funeral director reviews death record and electronically signs
 - Death record is routed to the local vital records office (LVRO) Work
 Queue
 - LVRO accepts the death record
 - State Vital Records Office (SVRO) registers the death record

- Cause of Death statements
 - The best medical opinion of the medical certifier
 - Capture the sequence of events leading to death, plus the time interval between the onset of each condition and death
 - Consist of two parts
 - ◆ Part I chain of events leading directly to death, with the immediate cause listed first and the underlying cause listed last
 - ◆ Part II for reporting all significant conditions that contributed but did not result in the underlying cause given in Part I

- Manner of Death
 - Can be listed as Natural, Accident, Suicide, Homicide, Undetermined, or Pending
 - Pending is only used when an investigation is still underway and there is reason to believe the investigation will clarify the manner
 - The National Association of Medical Examiners has established a guide on how manner may be determined
 - ♦ In some cases, the manner of death preferred by C/ME communities may conflict with disease classification

- SVRO reviews COD statements for legal acceptability per Wis. Stat. 69 and for adherence to NCHS medical coding standards
- Jurisdiction/reportable deaths per Wis. Stat. 979.01
 - Unexplained, unusual, or suspicious circumstances
 - Homicides, suicides, deaths following an abortion
 - Deaths due to poisoning
 - Deaths following accidents, whether the injury is or is not the primary COD
 - When a physician refuses to sign or cannot be obtained

- How is SVRO involved in death investigations?
 - Short answer we aren't
 - Medicolegal death investigation is a function of coroner/medical examiner offices
 - Oversight of investigation standards/policies related to is at the county level
 - SVRO's only oversight is in relation to the filing of the death record and legal acceptability of the death record as outlined in Wis. Stat. 69.18
