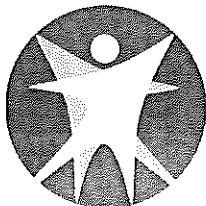

# OpioiD and Methamphetamine Treatment Centers: 2024 Report to the Legislature

This report covers the calendar year 2023 activities of the five opioiD and methamphetamine treatment programs created under Wis. Stat. § 51.422.

A total of 698 individuals were served in 2023. Services were provided through in person visits and telehealth technology.

Three opioiD and methamphetamine treatment centers were established under 2013 Wisconsin Act 195.

Two opioiD and methamphetamine treatment centers were established under 2017 Wisconsin Act 27.

These centers were created to reduce the harms associated with the use of opioiDs and methamphetamine by providing more access to services and supports in areas of the state with few options for care and treatment.

People diagnosed with an opioiD use disorder, methamphetamine use disorder, and pregnant women using an opioiD and/or methamphetamine are populations of focus for all five centers.

OpioiD treatment services include medications for opioiD use disorder as well as counseling and other therapies. These services are best practices for the treatment of opioiD use disorder.

Methamphetamine treatment services include peer support and approaches known as contingency management and the Matrix Model. These services are best practices for the treatment of both opioiD and methamphetamine use disorder.

The terms of their grant award require each grantee to report the total people served, including pregnant people served. Each grantee also must report the following for each person served: referral source, gender, age, race/ethnicity, education level, drug of use at time of admission, payer source, and employment status at time of admission.

There were no discharges from services due to overdose death in 2023.
