

CHAPTER 380.

[Published April 25, 1884.]

AN ACT to empower the town of Caledonia, in the county of Trempealeau, to levy a tax for the payment of bounties to volunteers.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The qualified electors of the town of Caledonia, in the county of Trempealeau, shall have power, at any legal meeting thereof, to vote to raise such sum or sums of money as they may deem necessary, for the payment of bounties to volunteers who have been mustered into the service of the United States or of this state, and credited to said town, which have been heretofore pledged to such volunteers, or which have been paid or advanced, for the discharge of any liabilities incurred by any person or persons for or on account of any bounties pledged or paid to such volunteers.

May vote tax to pay bounties to volunteers.

SECTION 2. In case the qualified electors of said town shall vote to raise any sum or sums of money in accordance with the provisions of section one of this act, the board of supervisors of said town are hereby authorized and empowered to audit all claims and demands of all persons for money paid or liabilities incurred for or on account of such bounties, and to draw orders on the town treasury of said town for the payment of all sums so audited and allowed by them, to be paid out of the money voted or raised under the provisions of this act.

Payment of bounty demands.

SECTION 3. All moneys voted to be raised by virtue of the provisions of this act, shall be assessed and collected in the same manner as other town taxes are assessed and collected.

Collection of tax.

SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
