

CHAPTER 245.

[Published March 19, 1875.]

AN ACT to allow sheriffs and constables to recover necessary and actual disbursements in certain cases.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Sheriffs and constables to be allowed for board and conveyance of prisoners.

SECTION 1. Every sheriff and constable, in serving criminal warrants, shall, in addition to the mileage now allowed by law, be entitled to all actual necessary disbursements for board and conveyance of prisoners; and when bill thereof is presented to the county board of supervisors for allowance, the said board shall allow only such sum as may appear reasonable and necessary.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 246.

AN ACT for the payment of certain moneys for legal services in enforcing chapter 273, laws of 1874.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Appropriation to L. S. Dixon, I. C. Sloan and H. S. Orton.

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated the sum of twelve thousand five hundred (12,500) dollars for the payment of legal services of counsel employed by the Governor, in the litigation between the state and railroad commissioners and the railroad companies, for the enforcement of chapter two hundred and seventy-three (273), laws of 1874, to be paid by the treasurer upon the warrant of the secretary of state, as follows: Five thousand (5,000) dollars to L. S. Dixon; five thousand (5,000) dollars to I. C. Sloan, and twenty-five hundred (2,500) dollars to H. S. Orton, in full for all legal services performed by them in the Circuit Court of United States and the Supreme Court of the state, in the aforesaid litigation.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 247.

[*Published March 15, 1875.*]

AN ACT to amend the charter of the city of Oshkosh, in the manner therein set forth, dividing the city into twelve wards.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. All that portion of section three, of chapter first, of chapter 501, of the private and local laws of 1868, and all that portion of section one, of chapter 403, of the private and local laws of 1871, which describes the boundaries of the different wards of the city of Oshkosh, are hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof, the following is inserted, establishing wards and ward boundaries, namely:

Amended.
Change of ward boundaries.
First ward.
First Ward. All that portion of said city lying north of Fox River, bounded on the north by Algoma street, east by Main street, and West by Wisconsin street, shall constitute the First Ward of said city.

Second ward.
Second Ward. All that portion of said city lying north of Fox River, bounded north by Waugoo street, east by Lake Winnebago, and west by Main street, shall constitute the Second Ward.

Third ward.
Third Ward. All that portion of said city lying south of Fox River and west of Lake Winnebago, and north of the southern boundary of the city, bounded on the west beginning at the middle of Doty street, where it intersects the south boundary of the city, running thence north in the middle of Doty street where it intersects the south boundary of the city, running thence north in the middle of Doty street, to Seventeenth, thence west in the middle of Seventeenth street to Nebraska street, thence north in the middle of Nebraska street to Fox River, shall constitute the Third ward.

Fourth ward.
Fourth Ward. All that portion of said city lying
