

and paid with the state tax to the county treasurer, who shall pay it over to the state treasurer with the state taxes.

Acceptance to be filed with secretary of state

SECTION 3. Before contracting any debt under this act, and before any of said funds shall be delivered to said treasurer in exchange for said certificates of indebtedness, the supervisors of said town of Loraine shall file with the secretary of state an acceptance of the provisions of this act, and of the terms and limitations herein provided for.

Vote of electors may be required.

SECTION 4. The said commissioners may, in their discretion, require the application for such loan, to be approved by a majority of the voters of said town on the question, at the annual town meeting, to be accompanied by a statement in writing, verified by the oath of the chairman and town clerk, showing the full number of votes cast in favor of said loan and against.

SECTION 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 271.

AN ACT to provide for the collection of statistics of pauperism and crime.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

County clerks to report.

SECTION 1. It is hereby made the duty of the county clerks of the several counties of this state to make reports relating to pauperism and crime in their counties to the state board of charities and reform, or any duly constituted authority performing its duties, in such form as the said board may prescribe, upon blanks to be provided by said board.

Duty of town clerks.

SECTION 2. It is hereby made the duty of the town clerks of the several towns in this state to make reports of pauperism and crime to the county clerks of their respective counties, and the board of supervisors of the several towns shall fix their compensation and audit their accounts for services rendered.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
