CHAPTER 275.

AN ACT relating to Wisconsin archæology.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The governor of Wisconsin, and the president and the secretary of the state historical society, are hereby authorized to negotiate with F. S. Perkins, with reference to the purchase by the state, of his archæological collection, at a cost not exceeding six thousand dollars, and to report to the next legislature the result of their negotiation, together with their views as to the expediency of the state purchasing the said collection, and as to the cash or salable value of the same, provided that nothing herein shall bind the sale in any manner by reason of any contract of purchase made by virtue hereof.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 276.

AN ACT to amend section one of chapter eighteen, laws of 1881, approved February 25, 1881, entitled an act to amend section two thousand four hundred and sixty-nine of the revised statutes, in relation to terms of county courts.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. That portion of section one of chapter eighteen, laws of 1881, relating to the terms of county court of the city of Milwaukee, is amended so as to read as follows: The terms of the county court of the county of Milwaukee, shall be held on the first Monday of February, the second Monday of March, the second Monday of May, the first Monday of June, the first Monday of September, the first Monday of November, and the first Monday of December. No jury shall be summoned for either of said terms except for those appointed to be held on the second Monday of March, and on the first Monday in June, September and December.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
