

holding stave bolts, ties and logs in and along the Kickapoo river, along the south boundary of lots number two (2) and three (3), in section seventeen (17), town seven (7), range four (4) west, Crawford county.

SECTION 2. The said Benjamin F. Fay and Ira Bisbee, their successors or assigns, shall leave a suitable passage for logs, lumber, ties or timber, so as not to obstruct the navigation of said river.

SECTION 3. This act may be altered or repealed by the legislature at any time after its passage.

SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

### CHAPTER 113.

AN ACT to authorize Hector C. McRae, Jacob Luengle and John Miller, their legal representatives and assigns, to construct and maintain one or more dams across Duncan's creek, at the city of Chippewa Falls, Chippewa county, Wisconsin.

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. Hector C. McRae, Jacob Luengle and John Miller, their legal representatives and assigns, are hereby authorized and empowered to erect, construct, repair, maintain and operate one or more dams across Duncan's creek, at the city of Chippewa Falls, Chippewa county, Wisconsin, in the northwest quarter ( $\frac{1}{4}$ ) of the northeast quarter ( $\frac{1}{4}$ ) of section six (6), township twenty-eight (28) north, of range eight (8) west; provided, said dam or dams shall not exceed twelve (12) feet in height above low water mark; provided, said dam or dams shall be so operated as not to materially or unnecessarily obstruct the natural flow of water in said Duncan's creek; provided, that the legislature hereby reserves the right to alter, amend or repeal the franchises granted in this act, whenever, in the judgment of the legislature, it is necessary or proper to do so.

May operate dams.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
