## CHAPTER 63.

AN ACT to amend section 523 of chapter 27 of the revised statutes, relating to the election of officers by town boards of school directors in towns having the township system of school government.

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. Section 523 of chapter 27 of the revised statutes is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Section 523. The members of the board, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, assembled at the first and each succeeding annual meeting, shall elect from their number a president and a vice president; also a secretary, who may or may not be one of their number, but who shall be a resident of the town to which the board belongs. Such secretary shall receive a compensation for services rendered, at not less than two nor more than three dollars per day, and he shall present a statement of his services rendered at the annual meeting of the board. Vacancies in either of the offices herein provided for, may be filled at any special meeting of the board, the notice for which shall state the object of the meeting to be to fill the vacancy existing, and persons elected to fill any vacancy shall hold the office for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Election of officers by town boards.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

## CHAPTER 64.

AN ACT to repeal section 1 of chapter 56 of the private and local laws of 1860, entitled "An act to provide for the holding of the annual school meeting in district No. four (4) of the town of East Troy."

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. Section 1 of chapter 56 of the private and local laws of 1860 is hereby repealed.
