

Adams, the first Tuesday in June and the third Tuesday in December. For the county of Columbia, the second Tuesday in May and the first Tuesday in December. For the county of Dane, the second Monday in January, the Monday after the first Tuesday in April, the fourth Monday in June, and the third Monday in September; but no jury shall be summoned for the term in June. For the county of Marquette, the second Tuesday in June, and the Tuesday after the third Monday in November. For the county of Sauk, the second Tuesday in March, and the third Tuesday in October. Every general term in the counties of Columbia, Dane, Marquette and Sauk shall be a special term for the whole judicial circuit.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 84.

AN ACT to authorize the construction and operation of telegraph and telephone lines within the limits of public highways.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Any person or persons may, with the written consent of the supervisors of the town, construct and operate a line of telegraph or telephone along and within the limits of any highway, subject to the restrictions and conditions contained in section 2, of this act.

Operating telegraph and telephone lines on public highways.

SECTION 2. All posts or poles used in the construction of such telephone or telegraph

How posts shall be set and es strung.

lines shall be set upon the boundary line of such highway, and in such a manner as not to interfere with the use of such highway by the public; and all wires strung upon such posts or poles shall be not less than twenty-four feet above the ground, at all public, private or railroad crossings, and not less than fourteen feet above the ground at all other places.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 85.

AN ACT to define the time "nighttime" when used in any statute, ordinance, indictment or information.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Term "night-time" defined.

SECTION 1. The time "nighttime" when used in any statute, ordinance, indictment or information in this state shall be deemed to be the time between one hour after the sunsetting on one day and one hour before sunrise on the next day; and in all cases the time of sunsetting and sunrise shall be ascertained according to mean time in the place where the term may be used, as given in any published almanac.

SECTION 2. This act shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication.
