CHAPTER 107.

AN ACT to create subsection 17 of section 4560a—12 of the statutes, relating to a closed season for pickerel in certain waters of Forest county.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. There is added to section 4560a—12 of the statutes, a new subsection to read: (Section 4560a—12) 17. It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch or kill in any manner or by any device any pickerel prior to the first day of June, 1918, in the waters of Beaver lake, Birch lake, Silver lake, Rat lake, Riley lake, and the waters connecting the same; all of said waters being in towns 35 and 36 north, ranges 14 and 15 east, Forest county.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.

CHAPTER 108.

AN ACT to amend section 1458a of the statutes, authorizing the board of agriculture to lease the state fair grounds whenever such grounds are not used for state fair purposes.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1458a of the statutes is amended to read: Section 1458a. Said board may occupy such rooms in the capitol as may be assigned for that purpose by the superintendent of public property. They shall have sole control of the affairs of the department of agriculture and of all state fairs and state fair grounds, *may lease the same whenever such grounds are not used for state fair purposes*, and may make such by-laws, rules and regulations in relation to the management of the business of such department and said fairs and the offering of premiums thereat, as they shall from time to time determine. The board shall make a report of their action to the governor on or before the first day of December in each year. The fiscal year of the state board of agriculture shall end on June thirtieth.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.
