

when he lost his left arm in the battle at Atlanta. He was honorably discharged on June 11, 1865, at Prairie du Chien.

Mr. Schreiner held many offices of trust in his home city and county. In 1910 he was elected to the assembly. His re-election and promotion to various offices is a forceful testimonial to the high esteem in which he was held by the citizens of Grant county as a faithful and able representative.

In the death of David Schreiner, Grant county and the state has lost a good and worthy citizen. Now, therefore, be it
