2017 ASSEMBLY BILL 507

2017 Assembly Bill 507 (“the bill”) allows a minor to operate a temporary stand without a local permit or license and without a state food processing or retail food establishment license. To qualify, the stand must gross less than \$1,000 in annual sales per year and be operated on a temporary, occasional basis on private property, for the sale of goods directly to consumers.

ASSEMBLY AMENDMENT 4

Assembly Amendment 4 increases the annual sales limitation from \$1,000 to \$5,000. It also specifies that a stand operated by a minor, which has gross annual sales of less than \$5,000, will be treated as an “occasional sale” that is exempt from the state sales tax and seller’s permit.

ASSEMBLY AMENDMENT 5

Assembly Amendment 5 specifies that a stand operated by a minor, as defined in the bill, may not sell potentially hazardous food.

BILL HISTORY

Assembly Amendments 4 and 5 were offered by Representative Kleefisch on December 1, 2017. On December 5, 2017, the Assembly Committee on Consumer Protection recommended adoption of Assembly Amendment 4 on a vote of Ayes, 5; Noes, 4, and also recommended adoption of Assembly Amendment 5 on a vote of Ayes, 8; Noes, 1. The committee then recommended passage of the bill, as amended, on a vote of Ayes, 6; Noes, 3.
